REPORT OF the Aberdeen Colored Free School. ABERDEEN, MISS., June 19, 1880.

Mr. Editor—We have just closed our city school of nine months, which resulted in much good in the way of advancement to the children.

At the closing of school we had two days' examination—Thursday and Friday. On Thursday we had the primary classes under Mrs. Annie Sims and Mr. Simon Rhodes, and I can say for them they acquitted themselves well in all their studies.

There were very few spectators in on Thursday, but on Friday my advanced classes came out to be examined, which included, practical arithmetic as far as cube root, and Maury's physical geography as far as glaciers and icebergs.

Next was the annual exhibition on Friday night, which began at 9 o'clock, and was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Blue, Pastor of the M. E. Church in this city.

I am pleased to say that all the Trustees were present, and we had the most perfect order. For the past three years we were compelled to dispense with very near half the pieces on account of noise and disturbance in the back portion of the hall; but I am pleased to say that we had the best order I have ever seen in Aberdeen during the exercises on Friday night, 18th inst. But above all, I was most pleased the next day. Parents came to me and said they were sorry that they did not send their children to my school; that they who attended had made wonderful improvement, and said they should have kept it filled all the year; that such should never be the case again.

One of my opponents went so far as to say the reason he opposed me was because I was set free when he was, and "wanted a man like Mr. Geo. T. Cook—from the North—who had been free all his life." I regret to see people so silly advised as not to know that there are as well educated colored men in the South as in the North. I hope, Mr. Editor, that we have but few such narrow minded men among us.
