

Pay Your Poll Tax.

A number of good citizens will find themselves debarred from voting in the primary election this year because of failure to pay their poll tax. No one can participate in a primary election under the new law unless all taxes required of him are paid on or before the first day of next month. The tax books show many delinquents who should awake to the situation and qualify by squaring up with the State and county.

This year promises to be the most interesting in politics since a long time ago, and the man who is disarmed of his vote will be powerless to express himself for the promotion of his State or of his favorite candidate. The various questions that are being projected by candidates are of vital importance to the people, and no good citizen should permit himself to become powerless to pass on them with his vote. State prohibition, the dispensary, the educational question and laws looking to better supervision of the State's business interests, as well as numerous other topics, are being warmly agitated and supported, and will engage the voter's most serious consideration.

The privilege of voting this year will be worth more than two dollars, the cost of the poll tax, and every man who has a spark of patriotism or interest in his State should bestir himself and settle his taxes before the first day of the approaching February, or forever thereafter cease to grumble or criticize his State government.

JANUARY TERM, 1903.

N. W. Hatch, county treasurer, made his report; approved.

T. T. Deavenport, superintendent education, made his report; examined and approved.

Ordered that petition for right of way along the public roads in this county of the Citizens' Long Distance Telephone and Telegraph Co. be rejected.

The commissioners appointed to lay out change in Fuqua cut-off road, in first district, recommended change at point north of Mrs. Fuqua's house where line of section 34 crosses said road; to run due west on said line, intersecting Athens and Smithville road, quarter of a mile south of Hatley. Report was approved.

It is hereby ordered on legal petition of more than two thirds of the resident free holders of said lands, in first supervisor's district, that following lands be included in stock law limits of first district.

Beginning at northwest corner of section 13, township 12, range 9 east, and running due south to Gaines' Trace, thence east with said trace to the northwest corner of section 8, township 12, range 17 west; thence east with the Trace to the half-mile line on the south boundary of fractional



Southern Farmers Improve Stock.

Practical stock raisers are wanted. They are in demand in the country along the Southern Railway. Farm after farm awaits their advent. Large packing houses will be established in the South, ships by the score will ply between Southern and European ports with shipments from Southern paddocks, ranges and pens. It will not require many years to develop the industry. We have for several years carried on an educational work in the interest of stock raising. The turning point has been passed; all the South is interested, the farmers in various sections are taking up the work of improvement, more will follow. Stock for breeding purposes is being brought in, more will be secured and the day is not far distant when the farms of the South will team with the finest animals produced.—Washington Southern Field.


