Remember that this is Not a New Registration, only supplemental to the 1919, and later registrations. All persons who will become 21 years of age before the 7th day of November, 1922, are entitled to register, if otherwise qualified. The election laws require that each voter subscribe to the oath provided by the Constitution of the State, and that one person cannot register for another, but that all persons desiring to register MUST be present, and sign the Registration Book for themselves.

Passenger Fares Reduced on Mobile & Ohio Railroad.

The Mobile and Ohio R. R. has announced that beginning Saturday and Sunday, May 6th and 7th, and continuing each Saturday and Sunday during summer season, to and including Sept. 30th and Oct. 1st, 1922, round trip week-end tickets will be sold between all points on the Mobile & Ohio R. R. at one and one-third fare, with minimum of \$1, tickets limited to return to original starting point by 12 o'clock midnight on Monday, immediately following date of sale.
