

The news was brought to Fort Fanning by express on the 29th ult. Five privates were missing at the time the express left Milanopy.

Two wagons, on the road from Pilatka to Fort Russell, were shot by the Indians on Tuesday last. They had started out a few hours in advance of the escort, and were shot 7 miles from Pilatka.

The Savannah Republican of Monday last, says that "the news in relation to the capture of the Indians by Col. Harte is confirmed by the arrival at this port last evening of the schooner Laurana, Captain Swasey, in 24 hours from St. Augustine."

CONGRESS, Jan. 12.—In the Senate, during the day, Mr. Crittenden gave notice that on Thursday next, he should call up the Bill to establish a uniform Bankruptcy. Many were anxious for the consideration of this measure, and he hoped the Senate would consent to consider it at that time, at least in the way of a beginning.

Mr. Calhoun addressed the Senate on the Pre-emption Bill. He appealed to the Senators of the New States to vote for his bill, graduating the price, beginning with \$125 per acre, and closing at 12 1/2 cents.

Mr. Crittenden defended his proposition of distribution.

Mr. Benton again advanced his positions against distribution.

In the House, Mr. Green of Kentucky introduced a resolution instructing the Committee of Ways and Means to report a Bill laying a tax upon wines and silks. Objected to by Messrs. Pickens of S. C. and Turney of Tenn.

Mr. Sergeant reported from the Judiciary Committee, the Senate bill for preventing the counterfeiting of foreign coin, silver, gold, and copper.

Also a bill confirming to the State of Indiana the land selected by her for that portion of the Wabash and Erie Canal which lies between the Tippecanoe river and Terre Haute.

Also an additional act for the punishment of certain crimes against the United States and for other purposes.

The bill to amend the act to abolish imprisonment for debt, which passed at the last session of Congress, was called up this morning, and received the sanction of the House.
