Names of the Men Singled Out to Guard the Interests of Custer County and Lead the Republican Party on to Victory--Records to be Proud of.

A. B. CURRY, REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY TREASURER,

Came from Terre Haute, Ind., to Iowa when quite young, and migrated from there to Minnesota.
