Orders have been issued directing Major Charles H. Whipple, paymaster U. S. A., to proceed to Fort Keogh, M. T., and there take station.

The Rev. Mr. Weeks, of Clifton, Ill., has been appointed to take charge of the Methodist churches at Miles City and Glendive, and is expected here in a few days.

Dr. C. B. Lobbler was called suddenly away from town yesterday to attend a patient on Misspah creek. During his absence Dr. Linn will attend to his patients.

The eastern train due here at 11:30 a. m. did not arrive until 1:20 p. m. The passengers took dinner at the Inter-Ocean before they started on their journey westward.

Wm. H. Harmon, post trader at Fort Lincoln, who has been in the city for a few days, left yesterday for O'Fallon creek, where he is heavily interested in stock raising.

D. F. Sherman, cashier of the Bozeman National bank, passed through the city yesterday. He has been east to purchase a safe to replace the one that was destroyed by fire recently at Merrill.

Guthrie & Ming cut out of their sheep herd yesterday two hundred head of choice mutton sheep, to be slaughtered and shipped east in the refrigerator car that came in over the Northern Pacific yesterday.

Lieut. Chatfield and lady, of Fort Keogh, were in the city yesterday, the first visit in five months. The Lieutenant has been on detached service at Camp Villard during the summer season, and only returned to Keogh a few days ago.

The sad intelligence of the death of Capt. F. H. Hathaway's only child reached us from St. Paul yesterday. Warm sympathies are extended to him in his affliction by both his Fort and city friends, which comprises our entire population.

After the fire last night the colored population had a little "Donneybrook" on the side. One darkey was obliged to send for a surgeon to dress his wounds. Dr. Jay J. Wood found the man in an insensible condition, but soon brought him around again by sewing up a yard or two of his scalp.

Mrs. Partello, as Fanny Fact, was deservedly applauded. The ladies are warrantably considered ornaments to Fort Keogh society. The various parts were assigned to the gentlemen appropriately, each deserving special mention. Lieut. Forbes, as Mr. Leeson, excelled. We have seen him now in a variety of parts, but believe the old man's part to be his forte. Lieut. Partello certainly filled the bill as the over sentimental lover. Lieut. Allison, as Hon. Chas.
