Mr. Seward and others are of the opinion that coal exists on the bluffs north of town. Some one should prospect them.

School opened on Monday morning, December 4th, with Miss Fanny Allen as preceptress. We understand there is a good attendance.

Harry DeVoe will be deputy sheriff at Livingston, and we congratulate the people that Sheriff Blakely has given them an efficient officer.

Every train brings in a number of capitalists to look over the attractions of Livingston, some of whom go to work at once in the construction of business blocks.

The railroad company are constructing a new wagon road through the canyon to take the place of the present road, which now occupies the road bed where the future Park line will be located.

Eight carpenters arrived on Wednesday evening to erect a temporary frame round house. During the present winter rock will be quarried for a large permanent structure in the early spring.

The gamey trout are being brought to Livingston in large numbers. Judge Bowen, townsite agent, recently bagged a fine string. When Geo. W. Wakefield, was blasting his ties loose, above Seebecks, with giant powder, hundreds of speckled beauties floated down to the eddies. The Yellowstone is alive with trout.

The coal now being opened up near Livingston is the first discovery of true bituminous coal made on the line of the Northern Pacific. It is destined to prove a most important factor in the future growth and prosperity of Livingston, and to supply the great demand existing for this coal, large yards will, we are informed, be opened here at an early date.

**A Bold Robbery.**

Sol Jennings is a bachelor ranchman who lives on the divide within about four miles of Wunderlich's. He does not take much stock in banks, and consequently keeps his money about home. He had about \$2,000 hidden under the floor, and last week, in a burst of confidence, told the wife of his assistant, named Freeborn, about the money. Last week Sol and Freeborn returned from work upon a distant part of the ranch and found the house topsy-turvy and Mrs. Freeborn in a state of great agitation. Between her sobs she told her story. Soon after the men had left the house two strangers, with veils over the upper portion of their faces rode quietly up to the door, and at once dismounting, ordered the woman to tell them where Sol kept his money. She snatched up her child and started to run from the house, but was immediately caught and rudely thrust into a chair. One of the men then placed the muzzle of a revolver to the head of the little innocent and said to the woman, "Damn you, give up your money or I will kill your child!" She gave him about \$300 which belonged to herself and husband. Not satisfied with this, the robbers by threats of instant death compelled her to disclose the hiding place of Jennings' money, which they secured, and then mounting their horses, rode rapidly away. **CORNER INVESTIGATION.**

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—The senate committee on corners resumed their session to-day. Mr. Henry Clews, banker and broker of the firm of Henry Clews & Co., testified that in his opinion corners are speculations when carried to extremes and have invariably led to disaster. Speaking of futures, the witness said in former years all of the crop was not known till garnered and sent to market, but at the present time, by means of cable and telegraph, the value of crops can be ascertained. This leads to speculation in futures. All inspecting houses deal in futures, and the goods sold or delivered in any month of the year. From the showing of samples the goods may either have to be made or grown. In the meantime they must come 3,500 miles across the seas. These transactions are legitimate speculations. There is no need for any legislative action to put a stop towards enterprise and legitimate speculation. Clews strongly deprecated any interference on the part of the legislature and cited cases to show that no interference should be permitted. In conclusion the witness said there was, however, a class of stock and grain dealing which should be suppressed by law, and these are bucket shops. This is merely betting on quotations as they pass over the tape indicator. The impediments held out by such concerns captures customers people of small means.
