Next Saturday there will be a grand masquerade at the skating rink, the best of the season. The usual excellent music will be furnished and no pains will be spared to make this a most enjoyable evening entertainment.

The sidewalk across the slough on Park street is getting worse every day. A person needs a clear head and steady step to walk across safely in the day time. After dark it is almost impossible to avoid the holes and bad places in the walk. This is a serious inconvenience to parties who have to travel this street as many of them need a broad walk and a firm one to get over safely.

A Correction.

A Much Needed Relief.

The lack of suitable approaches to the depot in Miles City for the landing of passengers is a great inconvenience. Miles City is one of the most important points on the road and furnishes the road a large amount of travel. And it is nothing more than fair that the railroad company should furnish some convenience in landing and taking on passengers at this point.

PROBATE COURT.

Jacob Schaffer, who was arrested at Fort Custer and brought to Miles City Wednesday night by Johnny Edwards, was arraigned before Judge Walker yesterday on the charge of horse stealing. He plead not guilty and was given until Saturday next to decide whether he will waive examination.

Herbert W. Lewis, who has been confined in the jail here for several weeks on the charge of grand larceny, had a portion of the preliminary examination yesterday. The time set for the examination is next Saturday but one of the witnesses, Jackson Downs, being here, his testimony was taken to-day to save him the inconvenience of coming next Saturday. The charge against Lewis is that he stole a horse from a ranchman on Powder river by the name of Hall. The case will be continued next Saturday when the other witnesses will be present. W. H. Ross is the lawyer for the prosecution and Judge Miller for the defense.
