The Success of the Fair.

The Helena Herald finds in an interview with Secretary Pope of the Territorial Fair association, that the fair just closed has been a financial success. The total receipts of the association were \$18,131.20; the expense account footing up \$14,044. The excess of receipts, about \$4,000, will be applied to the reduction of the old debt, which, with original mortgage and accrued interest now amounts to \$9,250. This is the first exhibition for some years wherein the association has come out ahead. For the past four or five years it has taken considerable rustling to enable them to hold their own, but now they are fairly started on the gain, and if next year's fair shows the same ratio of increase in receipts as is evidenced this year over the last exhibition of the association will find itself out of debt in a short time and able to expend money in much needed improvements on the grounds.


