The Smithsonian party returned yesterday from their quest for fossils and other interesting relics of the bad lands country. Their last camp was at Sand-creek, from where they were brought to Miles by government teams. Besides numerous fossilized specimens of bygone denizens of the forests and mountains, air and soil of this country, they were successful in getting twenty-five buffalo, the skeletons of which were preserved and are to be passed through the skillful treatment of taxidermists and added to the famous Smithsonian collection. The location of numerous fossilized remains was discovered and carefully marked for future investigation. The party express themselves as much pleased with the success attained and return to Washington fully determined to further prosecute the search for antiquities and pre-historic remains.
