The St. Paul Globe, in its military column states that owing to the removal of the regiment Second Lieutenant W. H. Chatfield and Charles G. Lynam, Fifth infantry, Fort Keogh, Mont., are relieved from the respective duties of acting signal officer and topographical officer of that post, and their duties have been assigned to First Lieutenant F. B. Jones, Twenty-second infantry. Lieutenant Jones thus becomes the Post-Bah of Fort Keogh, the offices of quartermaster, commissary, ordnance officer, commandant of Indian scouts, range officer and post treasurer having heretofore been imposed upon him. The office of post hatter is probably also within range of his vision.

HELENA'S NEW WATER WORKS. Results Achieved by the Woolston System at the Capital.

The report of the city engineer on Woolston system of water supply, which was formally turned over and accepted by the city council last week, is most satisfactory, notwithstanding the bitter opposition that the work met with during its construction. The statistical portion of the engineer's report shows that there is about 15 1/2 miles of mains laid, of which 13 are in the city proper, and the remainder leading from the source of the water supply to the pump house. The mains are 4, 6, 8, 10, and 12 inches in diameter, according to the possible demands likely to be made on the service in the different portions of the city. Five

lists were made from fire plugs located in different parts of the city through 100 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose with a 1 1/2 inch nozzle, with the following results:

The least results being attained at the corner of Rodney and Bridge Sts., and the greatest at the depot.

The pumps, of which there are to be two, were made by the Geo. F. Blake Manufacturing Co., of New York and Boston, and are known as the duplex, compound, condensing, with outside plungers. The high pressure cylinders are 16 inches in diameter; the low pressure cylinders are 28 inches in diameter; stroke 18 inches; diameter of water cylinders, 11 inches; capacity, 1,500,000 gallons in 24 hours, each pump. The well and pump house are located on property north of the city, below the Northern Pacific railroad track and near the fair grounds. They are distant about 2 1/2 miles from the court house. The company own about five acres of ground upon which they are located, which was donated by Mr. Kleinschmidt. The source of supply is a large well sunk on this property. It is 45 feet in diameter and 30 feet deep, lined with dry masonry half way up, the upper half being walled with stone laid in Portland cement to prevent the influx of surface water. In the bottom of the well are seven artesian wells, and with the springs that bubble up from the bottom, keep the well proper full and overflowing. At present the overflow is pumped into the reservoir to supply the city, and, though a million gallons are pumped out every twenty-four hours, the water in the well is not perceptibly lowered. The reservoir is located on Mount Helena. It is 151 feet higher than the court house and 450 feet above the pumping station. It is 23 feet deep, about 290x250 feet and holds 3,000,000 gallons. Its elevation gives a static pressure of 63 pounds to the square inch at the court house, one of the highest points in the city. It is what is known as a puddle-wall reservoir, built with sloping sides, paved with clay and broken rock and surmounted by a coping. The bottom is also paved with the same materials. The solid mountain forms its south and east sides, while on the north and west are made banks 22 feet high, 20 feet wide at the top and nearly 100 feet thick at the base with retaining walls laid in solid masonry. It is about 12,000 feet, or a little over two miles, from the pumping station. The works were built by Boston capital at a cost of about \$400,000 under a twenty years franchise from the city, all the stock being held by B-ston parties.

In view of the fact that our city government is now in correspondence with Mr. Woolston in reference to putting water into Miles City the foregoing will doubtless prove of interest to our readers.
