According to the Helena Herald, the Reilly and Wood's specialty company which appears at the Rink in Miles City to-night, gave universal satisfaction. They are the best specialty troupe that has been in the territory this year. The lead herd of trail cattle for the Home Land & Cattle company, consisting of about 6,000 head of cattle, is expected to reach their range in a week or ten days. The second herd is several weeks behind and contains 9,000 head.

Thoroughbred and graded Hereford bulls for sale by L. J. Whitney. John W. Buster, manager for the Continental Land & Cattle company's stock interests, has returned from Texas where he has been buying and arranging for the delivery of 12,000 head of trail cattle to their range on the Little Missouri. The first herd of 7,000 head has already been received and turned loose on the range, another herd of 5,000 being now on their way out.

A general merchandising establishment has been opened by Fountain & Brummitt, at Ekalaka, this county. The stock and fixtures of Cartwright Bros late of Terry, was purchased by the new firm and moved to the present location. H. F. Fountain, the senior partner is a merchant of Mingsville and will continue in business there, Mr. Brummitt being in charge of the Ekalaka store. 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Rather than lay ourselves liable to the charge of being indifferent or un-mindful of the public interest, we depart from our established custom in regard to anonymous communications and give space to the above. The writer condemns our "system of city government" and declares it to be "a first class humbug." In this we agree with him, but as the "system" is the offspring of our legislative assembly

we cannot see the justice of holding our "city fathers" accountable for it. Perhaps, however, our correspondent's syntax is not under as complete control as his flexors and extensors, and that he really intends to direct his "kick" against the city council, and not against the "system of city government." If so, it is his royal privilege to be heard in the council chamber, and we are surprised that one who apparently knows so much, and has the affairs of the city so much at heart, should deny himself the privilege and be content to appear before the people as an anonymous correspondent. In the brief history of our city government there has been but little opportunity for the expenditure of money for public improvement; the first city council was merely a provisional government, and its five or six months of office was taken up entirely with framing ordinances and building a foundation on which its successors could work. Owing to its short tenure of office it did not feel warranted in contracting anything in the way of public improvements, except the lighting of the streets—which appeared to be an immediate necessity—and purposely left other matters of like import to its successors. The present council have had two matters of this nature before them: The matter of sidewalks, which, owing to causes entirely beyond the control of the council has been delayed, but is now in a fair way to be brought to speedy completion; and the matter of a permanent water supply for the city. This latter it is scarcely necessary to say, was laid on the table in compliance with what appeared to be the majority wish of the taxpayers. Beyond this city governments past and present have had no opportunity to distinguish themselves as reducers of the surplus, except in the matter of the salary list, and we would venture a guess, only a guess mind you, that in this latter consideration is to be found all the animus of "Kronick Kicker's" plaint, and from ear marks of the document we are willing to bet four bits that "K. K." is a disappointed office seeker, who before his ox was gored held very different ideas in regard to the compensation of city officials than those implied by his communication. As regards the alleged negligence of the chief of police in impounding stray stock we can safely assert that complaints lodged with him will receive prompt attention. It is physically impossible for one man to cover all the territory within the city limits and be an eye witness to all violations or infractions of the city ordinances. Any citizen who is trespassed upon in this regard can find relief by making known his grievance to the chief of police. To-night the city council will meet in regular monthly session and no better opportunity can be had for "Kronick Kicker" to state his grievances and make his recommendations for the future government of the city.

In the action brought against Nels Linderberg by Ben Johnson, who claimed protection as to threats made by Linderberg, defendant waived examination in Judge Staehle's court, as to threats, and it appearing that bonds of \$250 with sureties would prevent the execution of such threats, defendant on filing bonds was discharged. His sureties are Geo. Rhoda and Olaf Nelson. Philip Halloway plead guilty to a charge of assault and battery and will be a guest of the county for ten days. In the civil suit of Michael Barrett vs. Sam Newnes, complainant fails for want of preponderance of evidence and costs are taxed to him; case dismissed. The statement of this case is that some time in July 1886—hay time—Newnes was hired to haul some wood sold by a supposed partner of Barrett's to a third party, and performed the task, receiving no pay for the same, however. Barrett claimed sole interest in the wood and came back on Newnes for the damage, succeeding in having him arrested. About six months thereafter Newnes was tried in a justice's court at Forsyth, by a jury without the formality of an indictment, for grand larceny. Fortunate for the prestige of the court and jury he was acquitted and the matter dropped until raked up again by the civil suit just decided by Judge Staehle.
