The last day of the Institute was opened at the usual time by singing, followed by prayer by Mr. Ware; after which the teachers joined in singing another song. Miss Howard and Miss Kate McKenzie, who had been appointed to read the gleanings from the press, entertained the Institute for a few minutes by reading some interesting bits of news. The minutes of the previous day were read and approved, and memory gems taken up.
