A Receiver Asked For.

A suit was begun in the district court today by the First National Bank of Miles City, against the Tongue River Irrigating and Ditch company, for balance due on a note and praying that a receiver may be appointed to adjust the affairs of the company. The Tongue River Irrigating and Ditch company is the title of the corporation that first undertook the construction of the irrigating ditch that is now in operation from Pumpkin creek down the east side of Tongue river to Dixon Bluff. As will be remembered, it was uniformly unfortunate in all its endeavors, and finally, in 1881, ended its active existence under the sheriff's hammer, the present corporation - The Miles City Irrigating and Ditch company - being the purchaser and successor. The old company had some unsettled business which dragged along from year to year, and it is with the intention of having these settled up and arranging the corpse for a long delayed burial that the suit mentioned has been begun. It is not in any way connected with the existing Miles City Irrigating and Ditch company.

Rolling Rocks.
