The Way It Is Done.

The exact method by which the cred-
itors of national banks that go into liqui-
dation receive their dividends will no
doubt be of interest to this community.
The natural assumption would be that
the receiver of the bank, whenever he
finds himself in funds sufficient for the
purpose, would declare and pay a divi-
dend from the money in hand, but such
is not the fact. The actual money in
the bank at the time of closing, and all
moneys received thereafter in the col-
lection of debts due the bank, are peri-
odically shipped to the Comptroller of
the Currency, for the credit of the de-
funct bank, and the Comptroller, from
time to time, as the amount thus placed
to the credit of the bank warrants, de-
clares and pays dividends, the payments
being made in government checks. This
procedure, in times like these, is open to
the objection that it not only locks up
and removes from any chance of circula-
tion here the actual money that the
bank closed with, but the same fate
awaits all that is paid in, in the settle-
ment of claims due the bank, and as
nothing goes but money it will be seen
that the closing of a bank brings this
disadvantage to the community in its
trail, as well as others. In the case of
the Stock Growers National Bank of this
city, Receiver Knight has commenced
the certification of claims due by the
bank, and hopes soon to write "finished"
on that portion of his job.

A Small Riot.

News comes from Cokedale, Park
county, to the effect that there has been
quite a difficulty up there a d serious
trouble is feared. As near as could be
learned the mining companies gave notice
of a general reduction in wages of
10 per cent, on all men, to go into effect
yesterday morning. At the time for
going to work only a portion of the men
accepted the decrease, and the others
gave notice that they not only would re-
fuse to accept the proposed terms, but
would prevent the others from doing so.
A free fight followed, and a number on
both sides were pretty well battered up
before peace was restored, but nobody
was dangerously hurt. Our informant
stated that the feeling was very bitter,
and when he left Livingston yesterday
news of further conflicts was momen-
tarily expected.

and that all reached the same size as the
one above referred to when at maturity.

From Livingston the report is re-
ceived that Sheriff Ramsey and posse of
Yellowstone county are on the track of
the men who recently held up the train
at Grey Cliff. Yesterday the officers
were at a point near Melville, about
eighty miles north of Big Timber, and
had found the place where the fugitives
had camped the previous night. There
were five of them, and they were head-
ing for Canada. Gay and Gross, who
murdered a deputy sheriff in Meagher
county some time since, are believed to
be with them.

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

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
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
