THE VIGILANT WON.

The Feat Taken as Indicating the Superiority of the Center-Boarder.

A Magnificent Contest From a Naval Point of View—Scarcely Enough of a Breeze.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Bowling along under a fair wind the American cup defender Vigilant crossed the line at Sandy Hook light ship at 3:30, winning the first of the international races for the American cup. The Valkyrie arrived home almost eight minutes later. It was a magnificent contest from a naval point of view, and demonstrated, for the day at least, the superiority of the center-boarder over the cutter, as well as the superior yachtmanship of the men who handle the American boat. One thing only was lacking, and that was wind. Never more than a light wind prevailed, and some times it was scarcely more than a puff.

The preparatory gun was fired sharp at 11:15, and when the starting gun was touched off there was a question of about 150 feet between the two yachts, the Valkyrie having the lead. The Valkyrie increased her lead about three lengths during the first two miles. From that point up to the distance of four and a half miles the Vigilant held her own. Then a change came. Suddenly the Vigilant caught a slant of wind, and within fifteen minutes she was fully a quarter of a mile in the lead. In another quarter of an hour the American boat not only held her lead, but increased it a full mile before she had sailed five miles. The American boat made the turn of the outer mark amid great enthusiasm. The wind was now west, and it became a question of long reach. It was on the reach that the cutter was supposed to be at her best. During the reach, however, with all things equal, the Vigilant actually gained on the cutter.

Up to the end of the course there was no incident. At the home line the flotilla of excursionists formed a crescent. Thousands of spectators braved immersion and clamored to every point of vantage. Their joy burst bonds as the brave little Vigilant dipped gracefully through the waves, and long before the screaming whistles told of a royal battle ended, a hundred thousand tongues had proclaimed, in true American record, that as yet the queen of center boarders and cutters was here and has still speed and strength to bear the name of cup defender in reality.

The regatta committee of the New York Yacht club gave out the following table of figures: Start, actual time, Vigilant, 11:25:30, Valkyrie 11:25:25; turning to outer mark, Vigilant 1:50:50, Valkyrie 1:48:50; finish, Vigilant 3:30:47, Valkyrie 3:38:25; elapsed time, Vigilant 4:05:27, Valkyrie 4:13:23; corrected time, Vigilant 4:05:27, Valkyrie 4:11:35. Thus the Vigilant won by five minutes and forty-eight seconds on corrected and official time. It will be seen that the Valkyrie gained on the stretch home, as she was eight minutes and six seconds behind when the outer mark was turned and seven minutes and thirty-six seconds at the finish in actual time.

Mello's Ultimatum. NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—The Herald's Montevideo dispatch says: Information has reached here tonight that Admiral Mello, commanding the insurgent squadron in the bay of Rio Janeiro, has ordered Peixoto to abandon the city within forty-eight hours, or the fleet will resume bombardment of the city. The diplomatic corps is in favor of Peixoto withdrawing from Rio, as it believes such a course on his part will terminate the war. Peixoto, however, refuses to yield, and is making fresh preparations to carry on operations with greater vigor than he has yet shown. One of his new projects is to combat Mello's fleet with ships as well as with the shore batteries. To this end the government has ordered the organization of a naval division of the north, which will be placed under command of Admiral Goncalves Duarte. The government has opened a \$4,000,000 credit to meet the expenses of the war.

The Balloon Ascension.

On Saturday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock crowds began to gather in the vicinity of Park and Pleasant streets to witness the balloon ascension to be made by Johnnie Sweeney. Some time was exhausted in passing the hat and inflating the monster balloon, which brought the time of the ascension to 4:30. At the command of Mr. Parker to "Let her go," all hands simultaneously freed the great airship, which gracefully sailed upward in a northerly direction. Sitting in the parachute about twenty feet below the balloon was Johnnie Sweeney, with as much apparent ease as though he had been sitting in a rocking-chair here below. After rising to a certain height, Chief Jackson was instructed to fire off his pistol as a signal for the aeronaut to cut loose the parachute, which was soon done, and the trip to earth started, and finished in a very short while. The ascension and drop was a complete success, and was thoroughly appreciated by all. It is the intention of the same parties to make another ascension on Wednesday afternoon, at which time they propose to give a more successful show if possible.
