OFFICIAL INFORMATION.

The Roster of the Next Legislature—The Republicans Have a Majority of 32 on Joint Ballot.

From an official statement made by Hon. Louis Rotwit, secretary of state the JOURNAL is enabled to give the correct roster of the next legislature. The senate will contain 13 republicans 5 democrats, 2 populists and one fusionist (dem. and pop.) The republicans and democrats each had four hold-overs. The house will contain 44 republicans, 12 populists, 2 democrats and 3 fusionists (2 dem. pop. and 1 pop and ind. rep.) On joint ballot the republicans will have 57, populists 14, democrats 7 and fusionists 4 giving the republicans a majority over all of 32 on joint ballot. Following is the official roster:
