## DEVELOPMENT RECEIVES IMPETUS

General Superintendent of Republic Coal Co. Here-Is Very Optimistic Over Outlook.

### MINE TO EMPLOY TWELVE HUNDRED MEN

Work on Dwellings for Miners to Commence Soon - Another Mine to be Opened.

W. W. Taylor, of Chicago, general superintendent of the Republic Coal Company, is in town this week looking after some of the development work at the mine here. Mr. Taylor feels very optimistic over the outlook for their mine here and sees a great future in store for Roundup. In an interview with a representative of The Record he said that in view of the fact that the body of coal on the lands controlled by the company is of such extent and the coal of such a superior quality there would be no delay in the development of the property. Already new improvements are being projected and work will be pushed as rapidly as possible, which together with those now in course of construction will greatly increase the output of the mine.

"The development of our mine here is yet in its infancy," said Mr. Taylor, "and no one at all familiar with the indications at present can doubt its efficiency. It takes considerable time and a large amount of capital to properly develop a mine of this kind and is not a task of a day. The coal is of a better quality than any mined in the state of Montana the vein being of such extent that several shafts will have to be sunk. We are already projecting another shaft in the immediate vicinity work on which will commence as quickly as possible and in all probability more will be sunk later on. Roundup will remain our headquarters and all our men will be stationed here which will insure a permanent camp at this place of considerable size. The slope, which was commenced last year, will be pushed thru to completion, and when once in operation with the new machinery a large amount of coal can be taken out. The vertical shaft now in use will later on be used only as an air shaft. We will employ from a thousand to twelve hundred men in the course of a year or so and the company is already taking steps to properly take care of these men. One hundred four and five-room residences costing \$800 each are to be built on the eight blocks of the townsite which have been reserved for our use. The material for twenty-five of these dwellings is now in transit and upon its arrival a crew of carpenters will be put to work on them. The addition of these buildings will be a material growth to the city."

While here Mr. Taylor placed Geo. N. Griffin in charge of the mine as superintendent. Mr. Griffin comes highly recommended, having been employed in a similar position in the Amalgamated mines at Storrs, Mont. M. H. Fletcher, who has been temporarily in charge, will remain with the company and will likely be transferred to the new mine as superintendent as soon as it is opened.

## POST OFFICE IS ESTABLISHED

George Osborne Appointed Postmaster of New Office to be Called East Roundup.

George Osborne received his commission Tuesday evening as postmaster of the new postoffice to be known as East Roundup which has recently been established here, and is now the official postage stamp dispenser. The postal department has made a good selection in designating Mr. Osborne as postmaster and Uncle Sam's business will be assured prompt and careful attention. The Record congratulates Mr. Osborne on his success in securing the appointment.

For the present the mail will be brought over from old Roundup but in a short time daily mail service will be had on the train. Pressure is being brought to bear on the department to make this change and we will undoubtedly have pouch mail from Miles City every day before long which will be an improvement much to be desired. To insure prompt and speedy delivery all mail intended for the new town should hereafter be addressed to East Roundup. The station will still be called Roundup and the postoffice at the old town will continue to exist, both of which will probably cause a little mix up and inconvenience for the time being, but it is hoped that things will adjust themselves more favorably in the course of time.

## A ROMANTIC DISCOVERY

Boys Find Old Saddle and Rifle Among Rocks Near Old Roundup Stolen Twenty-five Years Ago.

While playing in the hills near Old Roundup last week some boys accidently found an old saddle, a gun, box of cartridges and blankets neatly cached in the rocks, where they evidently had lain for some twenty years. The spot where they were found is in plain sight from the historic town and it is surprising that the find was not made before this. The blankets were badly rotted while the gun and saddle, being of a more substantial material, were in a better state of preservation. The saddle is an old style affair with an extra large horn as were in vogue twenty-five years ago and bears the imprint of a Billings saddlemaker. The gun is an old Buffalo Express rifle of obsolete make shooting cartridges of about .50 calibre.

Why this cowboy outfit of a quarter of a century ago was hidden here would make an interesting story were the facts known. Some of the old residents of Roundup recollect the theft of a gun and saddle about twenty-five years ago which had remained a mystery to them ever since, and it is thought that the present discovery explains the theft. The thief fearing that he might be caught with the goods, cached them in the place where they have remained safe and unseen for these many years, to await the time when the storm had blown over. Why he never returned to claim his booty or who he was are mysteries which perhaps will never be solved.

The bank will be located on the northwest corner of block twenty-seven.
