### A CARLOAD OF STOVES

Shows That Roundup is Coming Along Some--Another Car of Hardware.

H. E. Marshall this week placed an order for a carload of stoves with R. H. Martin of Billings, a representative of the Marshall-Wells Hardware Co., of Duluth, Minn., and also another car of building hardware and sporting goods. This gives one a vague idea of what a large volume of business is being done by that firm besides showing that Roundup is growing at no slow pace. The first car contains 150 stoves and ranges many of which have already been spoken for.

Mr. Martin, who covers the greater part of Montana, says that Roundup is one of the best towns he has in his territory.

### NO MORE SALOONS

County Commissioners of Fergus County Limit Number of Saloons For Roundup to Nine.

At the meeting of the county commissioners of Fergus county held at Lewistown last week, a resolution was passed limiting the number of saloons for Roundup to nine. Nine thirst parlors are more than enough for a city the size of Roundup and the commissioners are to be commended on their action in thus limiting the number. Roundup has already reached the limit set by the commissioners.

### Shoots Burglar

Martin Hawkins, one of the new proprietors of the Lone Star Restaurant, last Sunday night winged a burglar who was endeavoring to get away with some of his belongings. Hawkins sleeps in a tent near the restaurant and about twelve o'clock Sunday night was aroused by an intruder who had stumbled into his tent whether by accident or design he is unable to say. Refusing to say who he was or what he wanted Hawkins fired a few shots at random with his six-shooter whereupon the would-be burglar made a lunge for him and grappled him in his bed. Hawkins finally beat him off and while he was making his getaway plugged him. Shortly afterwards a man appeared at the back door of Thos. Graham's saloon and asked for the attendance of a doctor. Dr. Smith was summoned who found he had been shot in the left shoulder the bullet lodging in the arm. The wound is not serious. No arrests have been made in the case as it later developed that the wounded man was intoxicated and did not know what he was doing at the time, and as Hawkins pays for his doctor bill the matter will no doubt be allowed to pass over.

### NO COMPANY STORE

Supt. Taylor Says There Will Be No Company Store in Roundup.

The past several weeks there been rumors afloat to the effect that Roundup would have a company store, that is, a store backed by, and in connection with, the Republic Coal Company. While W. W. Taylor, general superintendent of the Milwaukee's coal mines, was in town last Saturday, the Record reporter took occasion to approach him on this subject and was assured that there would be no such mercantile establishment in Roundup. Mr. Taylor is very much opposed to a company store and is emphatic when he says that neither the coal company or the C. M. & St. P. would recognize such an establishment or have any connection with it whatever. Any store coming into Roundup must do so on an equal footing with the rest of them as no partiality will be shown in the least.

### A GRUESOME FIND

Railroad Graders Discover Skeleton of Man in River Bottom at This Place.

While working on the grade for the side tracks this week Wednesday morning, a grading crew discovered a skeleton of a man imbedded in the earth. The place where the remains were found is several hundred feet from the river west of the coal trestle and was buried about five feet in the ground. The skeleton is that of a white man, but, at this late date it is hard to conjecture how he came to his death or how long the remains have lain there. There were no marks of violence discernible on the skull or the rest of the skeleton so the theory that he was drowned in the river becomes the most plausible. The body may have been washed up to where it was found during high water or the channel of the river may have changed.

The skull is now on display at West & Jackson's saloon the rest of the bones having been placed in a sack and buried.

They have been keeping open all day Sunday and until late at night to accommodate the public but have finally reached the conclusion that customers can make their purchases on other days than Sundays and at reasonable hours thus giving them a few hours for recreation and other duties besides those connected with the store.
