## LOAD FIRST CAR OF COAL

Roundup Coal Mining Co. Sends Out First Car of Coal--Much Activity at the New Mine.

This is the first car of coal loaded by the Roundup Coal Mining Co., Roundup, Mont.

The above is the legend which car No. 26403 bore as it was pulled out of the local yards yesterday bound for the far east. The car, which marks the opening of Roundup's second coal mine, was finished loading Saturday, and as it is to be used by the C. M. & St. P., a telegram was sent to A. J. Earling, president of the road, to have the car bearing the inscription sent as far east as possible to get it before being used. The novel idea will undoubtedly prove a great advertisement to Roundup as well as the new company.

The Roundup Coal Mining Co. was organized on the 19th day of August and actual work on the mine commenced on the 28th, just four weeks ago. In this short time development of the property has progressed so rapidly that today the mine is in active operation. The trestle and dump have been completed, a spur has been built, machinery installed and about twenty-five buildings, miners' cottages and bunk houses erected. It has truly undergone a great transformation in the short space of one month and is the scene of much activity. G. W. Megeath, president of the company, is quoted as saying that the new mine would employ 300 men within twelve months.

### ANOTHER CHURCH

Catholics Take Steps Toward Erecting an Edifice Here--Father Mueller Assigned to this Place.

A meeting of the adherents of the Catholic faith in Roundup was held at the home of M. H. Wall Monday evening at which the question of building a church in Roundup was discussed. There are sufficient members of the church in and around Roundup to warrant such a procedure, and it was decided at the meeting to commence work on the structure as soon as possible.

Negotiations are now under way for the purchase of six lots in the new addition for a site for the edifice. The present plans call for a building 30x60 in size and will be so constructed as to allow of an addition, or to be used for other purposes after it becomes too small for the need of the city.

Fathers van den Broeck and Mueller of Lewistown were present at the meeting. The latter has been assigned to this place and will come here to reside in a week or so. One of the cottages of Wynn & Quarles has been rented for a temporary parsonage.

### NEW HOTEL OPEN FOR BUSINESS

The Grand, Roundup's New Hostelry, Opens to the Public--Meets With Splendid Success.

Altho the furniture for the rooms has not yet arrived, the new hotel which is to be known as The Grand, was opened to the public last Thursday and meals have been served to a large number daily ever since. The furniture is being expected any day and as soon as it arrives the management will be in a position to take care of their guests in the best of style.

Mrs. M. Schlee, the proprietress, feels highly elated over the general approval which her enterprise has met with by the public, and in return says that she will give the best service possible. An experienced chef has been secured which will assure the cuisine of the new establishment being kept up in first-class manner.

Mrs. Schlee has gone to considerable expense in putting up this hotel and her enterprise is certainly commendable. The liberal dimensions of the building allow of large, comfortable rooms, commodious office and dining room, and in the near future a bar will also be run in connection.

Elmer Muhs, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Schlee, of Davenport, Ia., is to have charge of the hotel.

## NIGHTWATCHMAN SHOOTS MINER

Andrew Bolinski Shot Twice by Nightwatchman Thurmond Sunday Morning.

Andrew Bolinski, a miner employed by the Republic Coal Co., was shot twice by night watchman Thurmond early Sunday morning. The first bullet passed thru his body penetrating the liver and the second struck the left leg between the knee and ankle shattering both the tibia and fibula bones. The wounded man is resting easily at this writing and it is not considered that his condition is serious.

Stories of the shooting differ widely and Thurmond has been severely criticized from some sources for his actions in the matter. The story of eye witnesses of the affair, however, if true, would justify his actions.

The shooting occurred about one o'clock Sunday morning on Main street near Marshall's store. Previous to the shooting Bolinski is said to have had some trouble with Chas. Young, a bartender in Callahan's saloon, and left the place. He returned shortly afterwards with a pack on his back and following it thru the streets, he saw a man, Thurmond, who had entered the place between the time he left the saloon and his return with the brick. Here the stories vary as some claim that Bolinski was not the man who threw the brick. Thurmond followed the man and gained on him until he was within a few feet of him when he stumbled and fell. At this time the man jumped to the officer with two stones in his hands and it was at this juncture that Thurmond pulled his gun. Thurmond was under the impression that he was dealing with a desperate character who was trying to lay him out in order to clear the way to commit some deposition, and ordered him to stop. On his refusal to do so he plugged him with his six shooter.

Bolinski was immediately taken to the company hospital where he was properly taken care of. It is not thought at this time that his wounds will prove fatal. Thurmond received an ugly cut above the left eye from the brick thrown at him.

Night watchman Thurmond is hired by the Commercial Club to make the rounds during the night and is deputized as an officer under Waldo.

### INSPECT EARL COUNTRY

Cashier Cheney and Secretary Carroll Make Hundred Mile Trip Thru Great Lake Empire Sunday.

Cashier Cheney and Secretary Carroll of the Commercial Club chartered Cal Millard's auto Sunday for a trip of inspection of the country north of Roundup. They went north as far as the Solar ranch and then swung around to Musselshell, returning to Roundup late in the evening.

This was Mr. Cheney's first trip thru the far-famed Lake Basin and the future he sees for it as a grain producing country would make any skeptic of the success of dry farming sit up and take notice. Mr. Cheney is thinking seriously of taking up a homestead in this truly wonderful country and building himself a nice country home.

While on the trip the popular cashier shot a rattle, the noise producer of which has gone forward to adorn the room of some fair damsel of Milwaukee as proof of his daring exploits in the wild and woolly west. It had six rattles.

### ACCUSED OF HORSE STEALING

William Hatch Bound Over to the District Court on a Serious Charge.

William Hatch of Musselshell, was brought up last Thursday for a hearing before Justice Cook on a charge of horse stealing. The testimony deduced at the hearing was of such a nature that the prisoner was bound over to the district court under \$1,000 bonds. In default of bail he was taken to the county jail in Lewistown to await trial.

Hatch, it is alleged stole a horse belonging to Thomas, a rancher, near the Crossing, on the 27th of August.

County Attorney Ayers conducted the hearing.

## ELECTRIC LIGHT PROPOSITION

Roundup Coal Mining Co. Makes Commercial Club Proposition to Light Roundup.

A special meeting of the Commercial Club of Roundup has been called for tonight at 8 o'clock at the Grand Hotel for the purpose of considering a proposition to put in an electric light and power plant by the Roundup Coal Mining Co.

J. R. Griedley of Omaha, one of the officers of the new company, arrived here yesterday and immediately presented his proposition regarding the lighting of the city. All the company asks at this time is the assurance of the Commercial Club that they will be granted a franchise as soon as the town is incorporated. Given this assurance they will go right ahead with the work, and, as Mr. Griedley says, will have the city lighted in six weeks. The company will also furnish power as their plant will run day and night.

The proposition seems a good one and should meet with the approval of every citizen of Roundup. A full attendance is requested at the Commercial Club meeting tonight.
