"KID ROYALS" AGAIN CAPTURED

Much-Escaped Horse Thief Is Again in Toils of the Law--Captured Near Bozeman.

"Kid Royals," the slippery gentleman who has a mania for stealing horses, has been captured again and is now in the penitentiary serving his unfinished sentence of 12 years. He was captured near Belgrade while working his way to the Musselshell country. He has been at large since making his get-away from the sheriff by jumping from a car window about a year ago. Besides this he has several other escapes from the authorities to his credit and unusual care was exercised this time in getting him to Deer Lodge safely.

Royals is well known in this section, having at one time operated quite extensively along the Musselshell. Those who know him say that he does not chew, drink or smoke, but that the desire in him to appropriate horses belonging to others is uncontrollable. Royals himself explains this state of affairs by saying that soon after coming to Montana when he was a youth of about 18, he slept one night with a horsethief, and, waking in the morning, found that his soul and that of the outlaw had been switched, leaving him with an almost insane desire to steal horses. The horsethief also became a changed man and ever after lived a model life.
