REP. RALLY A ROUSING SUCCESS

Largest and Most Enthusiastic Rally Ever Held in the Musselshell Valley.

ED. DONLAN AND CHARLEY PRAY HERE

One Thousand People Listen to Expounding of Republican Principles by Prominent Men.

The biggest and most enthusiastic political rally ever held in the Musselshell valley was that pulled off in front of the Grand Hotel last night when such prominent men as Ed. Donlan, candidate for governor on the republican ticket, Congressman Pray, Secretary of State Yoder, Railroad Commissioner Stanton, Judge Cheadle, Dan. Boyle, candidate for railroad commissioner, and C. W. Smith, candidate for the legislature from this county, addressed the people of Roundup and vicinity on the issues of the day. The gentlemen mentioned above came in on the evening train and were met at the depot by the Roundup Cornet Band as had been promised by M. H. Wall in a telegram to the chairman of the state central committee. Fully a thousand people gathered in front of the hotel to listen to the speaking, and the enthusiasm displayed by the crowd was most gratifying to the speakers. They declared that this was the most enthusiastic rally that they have yet had this year anywhere in the state and were pleased beyond measure at the reception given them here.

Judge Cheadle was the first speaker introduced by L. R. Carroll who acted as chairman for the evening, and his talk was well received. The Judge has no opposition in the coming election and therefore will continue to be the judge of this district for four more years.

Mr. Cheadle was followed by the Hon. Ed. Donlan, republican candidate for governor, who made a hit with his short, pithy speech and straight-from-the-shoulder statements. Mr. Donlan's genial personality and open frankness won many friends for him in Roundup.

A. N. Yoder followed Mr. Donlan and he was in turn succeeded by Dan Boyle, B. T. Stanton, C. W. Smith and Congressman Pray. Mr. Pray made the principal address of the evening and with his eloquence and personal magnetism kept his audience intensely interested. He dwelt on some of the questions which were before the last congress and coming to the issues of the present campaign, sounded a warning note against the putting into power of the democratic party which would inevitably mean a return to the conditions of 1893. His explanation of the workings of Bryan's pet measure, the guarantee of bank deposits, showing it to be unsound in principle and not practical in its workings was convincing. Mr. Pray is a forceful speaker and his address was interrupted by frequent and prolonged applause. Mr. Pray has just completed his first term in congress where he has made a name for himself, having received several important committee appointments, and if the reception given him here is any criterion, he will be returned to that position by a big majority.

O. W. Belden, chairman of the county central committee, made the closing remarks, and incidentally referred to some of the dirty methods of the opposition in fighting J. C. Huntoon for the office of county attorney.

All of the speakers paid glowing tributes to Roundup and its enterprising citizens and expressed surprise at finding a city of over 1000 inhabitants here. They went west on this morning's train.

SCALE SIGNED FOR TWO YEARS

Operators and Miners Agree on Wage Scale for Montana for Two Years.

W. W. Taylor returned from Helena Monday where he attended the joint conference of the executive committees of the coal mine operators and the mine workers of Montana, for the purpose of coming to some agreement over a wage scale to take the place of the one which expired October 1st. They succeeded in reaching an agreement without any trouble, the scale signed up being the same as the one which has just expired. This scale will now hold for two more years which means that there will be no trouble in the coal mines of Montana for that length of time.

The tonnage scale for Roundup and Lewistown has not yet been decided upon but undoubtedly will in a few days. A meeting of a committee of three from both the operators' and miners' association has been called to meet at Roundup Monday, October 12th, at which time the question of the tonnage scale for the mines at this place will be taken up. Another conference has also been called on the same date to decide on a similar scale for Lewistown.

J. U. Griedley of the Roundup Coal Mining Co., W. W. Taylor of the Republic Coal Co., and Thomas Burke of Helena will represent the operators at the meeting to be held here Monday.

MRS. C. F. BRINN DIES

Succumbs to an Operation at Seattle Monday--Had Only Been Sick a Short Time.

C. F. Brinn received a telegram late Tuesday afternoon informing him of his wife's death at Seattle, Washington, Monday evening, from the effects of an operation which had been performed on her. The west bound train now arrives here at 6:58 in the morning and the east bound at 6:20 in the evening. The new train carries a sleeper and diner and the usual twenty minute stop at this place has been discontinued. Simultaneously with the announcement of the change of time on this road a double train service was put into effect to Lewistown from Harlowton. The schedule is as follows: No 103 leaves Lewistown at 7:10 in the morning, making connections with the west bound train over the St. Paul at Harlowton. No 103 arrives in Lewistown at 12:35 p. m. No. 106 leaves Lewistown at 1:10 p. m., making connections with the east bound train at Harlowton. No. 107 arrives in Lewistown at 6:35 p. m. The west bound train which leaves Roundup 6:58 a. m. reaches Butte 7 o'clock the same evening.
