COAL CONTEST CASES HEARD

Contestants Lose in Two of Noted
Roundup Actions--Both
Cases Dismissed

Lewistown Argus: Two more of the Roundup land cases were decided by the local office this week, subject to appeal and they are no less interesting than important. Wednesday the case of John S. Truscott against Marcus Klein was taken up. G. W. Farr, of Miles City appearing for Mr. Truscott, while Edward Brassey and David Hilger, of Lewistown and Col. Goddard of Billings, represented the claimant, Mr. Klein. A large number of witnesses and others from the Roundup section were in attendance. In this case, Mr. Klein made a timber and stone entry on a tract in section 26, township 8 north of range 25 east, near Roundup.

Truscott, in his affidavit of protest, filed June 18, 1908, sets out that he was well acquainted with the land embraced in Mr. Klein's timber and stone entry and that the land is chiefly valuable for the coal deposits thereon; that the entry was not made in good faith, but for speculative purposes, and in order to acquire title to the coal deposits on the land.

The testimony on which Mr. Truscott chiefly relied to support his contentions was given by experts. They did not have an opportunity to do any investigating on the actual tract in controversy, confining their operations to land not less than a mile and a half distant from the Klein tract. From what they found there, they concluded that the big coal vein extended on to the land in controversy. This was a geological theory, supported, the witnesses claimed by all the evidence revealed in the formation. It further appeared there was coal on the adjacent lands, but no direct evidence was adduced to show that there actually existed on the Klein tract any vein of workable coal which would make the land more valuable for its coal than for timber and stone.

In the arguments Col. Goddard made a notable address, in which he referred to the many mistakes made by geologists in concluding that because the formations were of a certain kind and indicated certain things, veins must be found in certain places, but which, after the expenditure of vast sums, could not be found there. Going out of the record, Mr. Goddard referred to the conclusion reached by geologists and experts to the effect that a great vein of high grade coal could be cut at a certain locality near Joliet. The Amalgamated Copper Co., acting on the conclusions of these scientists, expended half a million dollars in sinking a double compartment shaft, erecting the finest tipples in the state and making other improvements, only to find that, after all, the coal was not there. So in this case, it was attempted merely to show by the conclusions of experts that because of certain conditions in a certain spot, there must be coal at a point a mile and a half away. Mr. Goddard contended that the contestant could not rest his case upon any such evidence, but must show by positive evidence that there was coal on this particular land, and that it was in such quantity, of such quality and susceptible of being so mined as to make the land more valuable for its coal measures than for timber and stone.

Mr. Goddard's argument was supplemented by the efforts of Mr. Brassey and Mr. Hilger.

In his reply, Attorney Farr, for the contestant, contended that the showing was all that was necessary under the law and he cited authorities in support of his petition.

At the conclusion of the arguments, Register C. E. McKoin sustained a motion to dismiss the contest on the ground that the contestant had not shown that the land was more valuable for coal than for timber and stone, this being subject to the right of appeal.

CLARK AGAINST HURLEY.
The case of Elmer B. Clark against Nellie Hurley, involving a timber and stone entry in the same locality was taken up. The testimony for the contestant was of the same nature as that introduced in the case of Truscott against Klein and when he rested a motion for a dismissal was submitted, Edward Brassey making the principal argument for Mrs. Hurley. The motion was sustained and the contest dismissed.
