STRIKE THRU MIS-UNDERSTANDING

Miners Out One Day at Roundup Coal Co.'s Mine--Go Back to Work Tuesday.

Thru some misunderstanding over the wage scale the Roundup Coal Mining Co. was forced to shut down Monday, but the difficulty being straightened out resumed work again Tuesday morning. The trouble arose over the tonnage scale which the company put into effect Monday in place of the day scale under which they have been working. It appears that the miners were under the impression that the scale recently settled upon at Helena only applied to the Republic Coal Co. and did not effect the new company and when the change was made Monday refused to go to work. Thomas Gibson, president of district No. 22 United Mine Workers was sent for who succeeded in settling the trouble. The new scale now being paid is 70 cents per ton. The Lewistown miners are still out having refused to accept the scale adopted at Helena two weeks ago whereby they were to receive \$1.28 per ton.

"Y" CLUB

Misses May and Lillian Buckley were in from their ranch at Thirty Mile to participate in the big Eagles dance Tuesday evening.


