## BRANCH TO SUGAR CITY

Milwaukee Will Probably Build to Billings From Roundup in the Spring.

"It is generally understood among railroad contractors employed on the extension that a branch of the St. Paul line will be constructed from Roundup to Billings as soon as spring is well advanced being the first branch line of the new trans-continental railroad to be constructed," declared a prominent Milwaukee official recently.

"The intention of the company to build this branch is common talk and from what I gather the surveys have already been made.

"It seems that the Milwaukee is anxious to get some of the business, which originates in this section and also to be able to place the coal from its mines on the Billing market, believing that Billings is destined to make great strides in a manufacturing way and thus have a big demand for fuel in the near future.

"I have it from good authority that it is the intention of the company to build this railroad just as soon as it has its coast extension completed and it has advertised that it will have trains running to the coast by July 1 I am inclined to think that the prospect of trains running on a branch of the Milwaukee into Billings inside of eighteen months and probably inside of one year are excellent.

"It is the understanding of the contractors to whom I talked that the branch to Billings will be extended to Yellowstone National park, going up the Stillwater river to the vicinity of Cooke City and opening a rich, but undeveloped country.

It has been generally conceded that the branch from Roundup to Billings would be built as was stated in The Record some time ago.

## EXTORTION CASE DISMISSED

Case of Gilder vs. Carpenters is Dismissed—Settled Out of Court.

Acting upon the advice of the county attorney, the case of A. M. Gilder vs. Zimmerman, Toomey and Harden, who constituted a committee acting in behalf of the local carpenters' union, has been dismissed. The case against the committee was one of alleged extortion arising from the assessing of a fine against the plaintiff's building by the local union for employing non-union labor.

While the case was pending awaiting the session of the district court Gilder disposed of the building to O. J. Haugen, who succeeded in reaching an amicable settlement with the union resulting in the building being declared fair by the labor organization. There remaining no cause for action the case was stricken from the calendar by order of County Attorney Ayers.

## MAIL SERVICE TO BUTTE

Railway Postoffice Established on St. Paul This Week—Is Great Convenience.

Railway mail service has been inaugurated on the St. Paul railroad between Miles City and Butte, all arrangements having been made by Charles D. Wilson, superintendent of that branch of the postal service in this state. Just how many additional clerks will be added to the force working out of Butte by the St. Paul service has not been announced but it probably will be four. The first mail car was run Monday morning going west.

For some time past there has been pouch mail service between Miles City and Harlowton.

Under the new arrangement the run from Lombard to Lewistown will curtail to between Harlowton and Lewistown, and the ends of the runs for the clerks on the main line of the St. Paul will be Butte and Miles City, the run to be known as the Butte-Miles City division. The establishment of a railway post office on the St. Paul will bring Butte into much closer touch with Lewistown and Musselshell country than heretofore and will be of much benefit to the jobbing interests of that city as well as to the residents of the territory bordering along the St. Paul. Already mail service is established over the St. Paul from the east into Miles City.

## ST. PAUL PAYS SOME TAXES

Railway Company Turns in Over \$7,000 Into Fergus County Treasury.

The question as to who leads in the list of heavy taxpayers this year is settled, the honor going to the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway company, which has just turned into the coffers of the county a little over \$7,000. The Montana Railroad is a close second, it having just one mile less of mileage than the Milwaukee. The latter company's assessment will be greatly increased next year, when all of its property in the county will come in.

The real rush at the treasurer's office commenced today, and it will continue without interruption until Monday evening at 6 o'clock, after which, under the law, all unpaid taxes become delinquent.—Argus.

## LEWISTOWN MINERS OUT

Lewistown Coal Miners Firm in Their Demand for Increased Wages.

The coal miners held a meeting at their hall Monday evening, when the walk out at the Spring Creek mines was discussed, but no action was taken looking to a settlement of the trouble, says the Lewistown Argus. In fact, the parties appear to be further apart than ever. The miners announce their determination not to return to work at the scale agreed at the Helena conference, while the management states that this offer is the best that can possibly be made and there the matter stands. Meantime all the other properties are mining the usual amount of coal, so that the danger of an immediate shortage has been overcome and it is likely that there will be a sufficient supply to meet the purely local demands throughout the winter.

County Commissioner Neil was in town several days this week. While here the opportunity was improved to show him that some of the roads in this vicinity are badly in need of fixing and he promised to do what he could in seeing that something would be done to remedy the condition.


