IS NOT DONE FOR ECONOMY

Real Reason for Peculiarity Noticeable in Cigarettes Smoked by Russians.

"A good many men," said a tobaccoist the other day, "ask me about the peculiar shape of the mouthpiece of Russian cigarettes. The Russians, you know, put a hollow cylinder of fine pasteboard on the end of the cigarette which is put into the mouth. The tobacco ends where this pasteboard cylinder begins. Most people suppose the idea is to enable you to smoke all the tobacco to your cigarette, believing the czar's subjects to be an economical lot, see? But that's not the real inwardness of the scheme. It's the only explanation Americans are likely to think of, because they haven't the reason here which forces the Russians to make their cigarettes as they do. The fact is, the St. Petersburg crowd are a bearded lot, and their whiskers don't do a thing to the average Egyptian of Turkish cigarette.
