## HAS NEW LANDLORD

**Mrs. Schlee Rents Hotel to J. H. Danils Who Takes Charge Wednesday.**

The Grand Hotel has a new landlord, Mrs. Schlee, proprietor of that popular place, having rented the building, furnished, to J. H. Danils, who arrived here from Kendall this week, taking charge Wednesday morning. Under the management of Mrs. Schlee the Grand has attained an enviable reputation among the traveling fraternity, and has become one of the most popular stopping places along the line. The new landlord is a thoroughly experienced hotel man, having conducted a large place at Kendall for a number of years. Mrs. Danils will also assist in the management of the Grand. They will no doubt enjoy a large volume of business. Mr. and Mrs. Max Schlee will leave in a day or so for Hunter's Hot Springs, where they will remain for two weeks, after which they will go to White Sulphur Springs, returning from there to Roundup. Although they will make their home in this city, they are as yet undecided as to what line of business they will follow.

## SECURE CHANGE OF VENUE

**Cases Against Saloon Men to Be Tried in Justice Court at Melstone.**

A change of venue from the local justice court to Justice Park's tribunal in Melstone was secured Monday in the cases of the city against John Polisch and Gradisher & Mole. At the trial before Justice Martin Monday the defence made an attempt to have Justice of the Peace Martin disqualified to sit on the cases on the grounds that he failed to file his bond and take the oath of office in the required ten days after election. Failing in this an affidavit of prejudice was filed and the change of venue secured. At this time it is not known when the cases will come off. It will be remembered that the actions were brought against the above named defendants for conducting saloons without city licenses.

## GRAND HOTEL BAR CHANGES

**Ferdinand Klokow Assumes Control of Bar in Popular Hostelry This Week.**

The basement is now being remodeled, the walls plastered, cement floor laid and steel ceiling put in, and when completed according to the plans, will make a neat place. A stairway is also being built from the sidewalk.

## ROUNDUP TO BE CITY OF THIRD CLASS

**Council Takes Steps to Have Roundup Classified as City—Application for Saloon License Refused.**

Steps were taken by the city council, which met last night, to have Roundup reclassified by the county commissioners as a city of the third class instead of as a town under which head it is now included. In order to be able to classify as a city of the third class Roundup must have a population of 1,000 or over, which mark has been passed for some time. City Clerk Jameson was instructed to take a census of the city at once, after which the matter will be taken up with the county commissioners. It is expected that the census will show a population of at least 1200 or over.

Considerable advantage can be gained by the reclassification.

The application of J. A. Sparrling for a license to open a saloon in the Commercial Hotel on Second street east was refused. This action was in keeping with the council's policy not to grant any more licenses thereby conserving the best interests of the city.

J. M. Balwin was appointed policeman to be on duty nights. Evans & Co., were granted permission to construct a basement stairway projecting into the sidewalk in front of their building on Main street. Several bills were also allowed.

## ODD FELLOWS ORGANIZE

**Lodge Instituted Wednesday Evening With 30 Members—Grand Master Installs Officers.**

**Roundup Mercantile Co. to Open Establishment at Coal Camp October 1st.**

The Roundup Mercantile Company is making arrangements to open up their new store at camp No. 3 in about two weeks. The build-

ing, 30x80 in size which is situated north of the tippie, was completed this week, a big opening dance having been held therein Wednesday evening. It is expected that the stock of goods will begin to arrive within a few days and that the store will be ready to open to the public by the first of October.

The personnel of the new company is not yet given out, but will as soon as the necessary steps are taken toward the incorporation of the concern. E. E. Congdon, however, will be manager of the store. It is understood that only staple groceries, mining hardware and necessary household goods will be carried in stock.

## NEW BRICK BUILDING

**Work Started on the New Gibb Building on Main Street This Week.**

It is understood that Mr. Lohman has already leased the building he now occupies, but it is not given out who the tenant is.

**New Rooming House on Upper Main Street is Ready for Business.**
