A sketch of a Murder and the Town of Coulson. It was midnight of March 31st, 1882. The small town of Coulson was alive with gamblers, drunken men and fallen women.

At the other end of the street was a large saloon, owned and run by one Jack Skilton. In this building was congregated a number of men, some participating in, and some watching, the games of chance.
