The grand jury of Gallatin county, on examining the assessor's books, did not in its official capacity, cast any doubt upon the honesty of the 'individual' in question.

In the opinion of many the only theory that can be established as a truth is that the assessor used discrimination in his work, connected with a criminal negligence.

The following are some of the irregularities: A large number of well known and prominent business firms and individuals have not been listed in the assessment.

Many lists contain no date whatever, omitted post-office addresses, and failed to give the ages of parties assessed.

City additions, subdivided into lots were listed at unreasonably low prices per acre.

Certain property assessed at less than one-sixth of its true value, while neighboring property was assessed at its full value.

It is improper even to ensure a man for such work, the tax payers of Gallatin county are surely in a lamentable condition.


