### More Are Saving.

"The theory that a few 'malefactors of great wealth' are absorbing all the money of the country" says an authority on finance, "does not find support in the history of savings banks. The total deposits in 1898 were \$2,028,409. The returns for 1908 show deposits of \$3,990,553,945, an increase of 80 per cent in ten years. It was not until 1883 that deposits reached the billion dollar mark. Fifteen years later they were \$2,000,000,000. Seven years brought them up to \$3,000,000,000, that mark being reached in 1905. If no further interruption comes they will probably reach \$4,000,000,000 by 1910."

One of the most encouraging signs of the times is the great increase of savings by the poor, even though the times have been comparatively hard the past year. A little pinch of hard times seems to have been a strong reminder to many that nothing pays better than to have a few dollars ahead in case of trouble, sickness or hard times. When the average American has learned that as the average foreigner has, we shall be a much safer people and government.—Dakota Farmer.

### Mrs. Astor, 30 Years Social Leader Of New York, Dead

New York, Oct. 30.—Mrs. William Astor, who for 30 years has been regarded as the social leader of New York, died tonight of heart disease, at her home on Fifth avenue. For nearly four weeks Mrs. Astor, who was 82 years of age, had been in a critical condition, owing to the return of a heart affection that had given her trouble for years. Despite her advanced years, she continued to hold her social domination up to a year ago, when failing health compelled her to retire into comparative seclusion.

The society functions given and presided over by Mrs. Astor were among the most brilliant on record. It is said that the ballroom in the mansion on Fifth avenue would accommodate 1,000 persons. It was Mrs. Astor who established the famous "400" her visiting list being confined to that number of names. In 1905, however, she was said to have "let down the bars" when she invited 1,200 persons to one of the most memorable social events ever given in New York.

Mrs. Astor received her guests at these gatherings seated in a high-backed chair beneath a portrait of herself painted by Carolus Duran. The Astor jewels were worn by her on these occasions. It is said the Astor emeralds are the finest in the world.

William Astor, who died in Paris in 1892, took little part in the social activities his wife enjoyed.

Mrs. Astor before marriage was Miss Caroline Schermerhorn, a daughter of Abraham Schermerhorn, a well-to-do merchant. She was married to Mr. Astor, Sept. 23, 1853.

John Jacob Astor was their only son. There were four daughters, two of them, Mrs. Ogilvie Haig and Mrs. Orme Wilson now living. The eldest daughter, Miss Emily Astor, who married J. J. Van Alen, died some years ago, as did Miss Helen Astor, who married James Roosevelt.

### QUARANTINE ORDER MAY BE MODIFIED

Helena, Oct. 29.—Dr. Robert H. Treacy, federal inspector in charge of this district, has been in Helena consulting with the livestock sanitary board relative to Governor Norris' proclamation against South Dakota on account of anthrax in that state, requesting that the sanitary board release their quarantine, stating as his reason that the disease was at present under reasonably fair control.

The board was not willing to release the quarantine, but conceded a modification of it, permitting the shipment of domestic animals from South Dakota into Montana when properly certified by federal inspector under the further provision that all immigrant or other cars should be properly disinfected, together with their contents, under supervision of the federal inspector, certification of this fact to be made and certificate issued.

The board at this meeting, also, on motion of the chairman, issued an order prohibiting the use of any commercial anthrax vaccine in the state of Montana unless certified and indorsed by the chemical division of the bureau of animal industry. The sanitary board further ordered that no productive antitoxin or vaccine of any sort for veterinary purposes be used in Montana, excepting when properly certified and indorsed by the bureau of animal industry.

This order is necessitated by the fact that the use of commercial anthrax vaccine in South Dakota, Illinois and the Northwest territory has been followed by disastrous results; in fact, producing the disease instead of giving immunity from it.

The federal authorities who have had charge of the anthrax outbreak in South Dakota have it pretty well in command, and it is believed no further cases will occur this year.

The losses in South Dakota in the locality affected have been enormous, particularly heavy among horses and cattle and especially so in swine.
