## County Division

It is an assured fact that citizens of Wibaux have made up a purse to use in a campaign for county division, with Wibaux the county seat of the new county of Wibaux. It is being noised abroad that Maxwell, Finch, Bendon and Leiper are in favor of such county division and have promised those Wibauxites their sympathy and aid in favor of the scheme. The time is hardly ripe for a division of the county, but in any event it seems to us to be poor politics for the candidates for office to mix up in such measures. It is hardly good form.

## The Reward Of Treachery

The declarations of some of the people of Glendive, accentuated by the delegation from Ward 1, that the contest was instituted to down the bosses in the party, has not borne fruit by any act of the Republican Convention in that direction, except to swell up little Bill in his own excessive imagination. As a recompense for his treachery to his former friends, he garners the dead sea fruit, which he fondly hoped would bring to him the fruition of his hopes and a surcease of his fears, but he now learns that the price of treason is political death. The honors that his confederates sought to bestow on him are but gall and wormwood to his cankerous soul.

As a rule men find some way to excuse or palliate their acts upon which a doubt of their legality is cast when committed in the heat of political mixups, but the means resorted to at the primaries furnishes them not even a ray of hope whereby they may vindicate their course or justify their acts in the successful and wholesale debauchery of the ballot box. Some of these men disclaim all knowledge of the same and reject the accusation that they were participants, but at the same time they appropriated the fruits of such crime by accepting the emoluments thereof. They hungrily picked the carcass and adorned themselves with buttonhole bouquets that they might be as conspicuous in the enjoyment of the fraudulent feast as their Democratic servitors were in furnishing the same. The tactics employed at Wooley's Ranch and Wilder's Landing were a matter of political history of sufficient importance to warrant them in the belief that they were worthy of repetition at this time. They brought them out in all their nakedness and used them to down the leaders, and as a mask to their enmity, they elevated Big Boss Bill, and pledged the Republican party in this county to support him for the United States Senate. The party has been guilty of blunders but taking that convention as a whole, it made an amalgamated ass of itself without fuss or feathers. The party has not displayed such asinine abilities since old Roek and Rye presided over its deliberations, yet these are the men who claim for themselves to be progressive Republicans and demand an honest ballot and a fair count. Vaux, Lynch and Hopkins were appointed to carry out what Little Bill had mapped out, and they carried it out to its fullest extent. They made out a certificate of good character to these political muckrakers, excusing themselves upon the

ground of urgent necessity for party harmony on the one hand and ignorance of the cause of the trouble on the other.

If the party will accept Democratic votes and illegal votes at its primaries in numbers that equal the entire strength of the party, as prize packages for party harmony, then let it be known throughout the county that the admitted delegation has an abundance of that kind of harmony on tap on all occasions, so much so that they have a reserve in the Citizens' party of sufficient magnitude to relieve the fears of Big Bill for the future.

When the Republican party turned over to the two Democratic bosses the management of its primaries in Ward 1 of this city, it not only demonstrated that things were to be done that ought not to be done, but that they themselves did not dare to do in the open, that which their agents would do covertly.

The air is silent as to your refutation of these charges, while the reward for your treachery shall be our eternal condemnation. You may profit by such practices, but the silent censure of your neighbors shall always be with you as an accuser of your dishonest practices. We notice that you are not gloating over your victory, for the reason that your methods resorted to were so nearly criminal that the layman cannot discover the line of demarcation between that which is legal and that which is illegal. Heretofore the nominees of the party have had a clean slate to work on, but now they find it smirched with treachery, deceit, fraud and a debauched ballot. We commiserate with you on your unhappy condition of mind.
