Stockmen of Custer County Meet Fate While on Way East with Cattle.

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 30.—Stockmen from Montana and Dakota were killed, two injured, and seriously that there is chance of their recovery, and a fireman badly crippled. BIG LAND RUSH IN FULL BLAST

Opening of Flathead Reservation Finds Eager Crowds Waiting the Great Race.

Kalispell, Oct. 31.—The fireworks that will mark the opening of the last Flathead Indian lands to public entry, at 9:00 o'clock tomorrow, were primed at noon today, when the first claimant took his station at the land office door, and is tonight keeping vigil there in company with several others, who arrived later.

Some exciting races are expected tomorrow, for it is known that many have hired horses, and have had them made ready in relays. Others have chartered gasoline launches, and will leave for their expected homesteads tonight, plowing their way up the west shore of the lake in the darkness, while the great throng will reach Somers by early regular boats tomorrow, and will overflow the train on its return.

For the first time since the reservation lands began to be doled out to the holders of lucky numbers, there is genuine and tense excitement attending, and many who are most familiar with the situation look for the greatest land rush that the west has ever seen.

Missoula, Oct. 31.—The Flathead reservation will be opened for filing tomorrow. A large number of prospective settlers are in Missoula, and the local force at the land office expects a lively time when its doors

are thrown open in the morning. Many contests will be filed as several persons have already declared their intention of settling on the same tracts and have complied with all government regulations. Much difficulty is expected in the matter of determining priority for filing. There are about 500,000 acres of grazing land open for settlement, about one-half of the territory that was available for settlement when the reservation was opened. In addition to the above unclaimed grazing land, there are 800 farm units left unclaimed. This land will all be under irrigation, as soon as the government finishes the work it is doing on the reclamation project.

Coeur d'Alene, Ida., Oct. 31.—Shivering in miner tents, some without shelter and little bedding, are perhaps 1,000 "sooners" squatting on land in the Coeur d'Alene reservation tonight, awaiting the signal that shall open the unallotted tracts to general settlement tomorrow. Following the recent land drawing, all who drew lucky numbers and did not file lost their chance. The numbers were exhausted, and when all had been given a chance, the people of the United States are given a chance to file.
