U. S. Weather Bureau, Helena, Mont.  
 The last week was unusually warm throughout Montana. From the 17th to the 20th the day temperatures were generally in the seventies, and a high temperature of ninety was reported at Billings on the 13th. Fairly good showers occurred over practically all the state except in the northern counties east of the Divide. There were several good rains west of the main range, and in some localities the soil was too wet for seeding. Spring seeding made rapid progress and in some places the work was about half completed. The week was exceptionally favorable for stock, but in most sections additional moisture is needed for the range.—R. F. Young, Section Director.
