ADVANTAGE OF ENSILAGE ON YOUR FARM

An acre of corn, if properly put in a silo, produces more digestible and more palatable food from an acre than any other crop. Enough corn fodder spoiled and was wasted on many Dawson county farms last year to have paid for a pit silo and cutter.

Silage can be carried over from year to year like a banking reserve fund to fall back on when weather conditions or hail cause a crop failure. Corn silage and alfalfa constitute a balanced ration.

More tons of feed can be sheltered more cheaply in a silo than in any barn, stack or shed. The average pit silo can be built at an actual cash outlay not to exceed \$60. Most of them can be built much cheaper.

If you are interested in the pit silo this year, call on your county agriculturist. He will be glad to call at your farm, discuss the matter with you, and assist you in laying out the plans and in getting started.

OVERDRAFTS ARE DEBTS

As Such They Must Bear 2-cent Stamp, Says U. S. Department

The commissioner of internal revenue has published a notice to banks that checks which are drawn and which create or increase an overdraft at a bank, are considered as a debt and must be stamped under the Act of 1915.

A 2-cent stamp for each \$100 or fraction thereof must be attached to all such checks.

COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

What it is and What Montana Statutes Provide.

The salaries of the mayor and the two councilmen are the only ones named in the commission form of law. Every other officer or assistant "shall receive such salary or compensation as the council shall by ordinance from time to time provide, payable in equal monthly installments."

The commissioners are required to meet regularly, and admit the public. The first regular meeting is required to take place on the first Monday after the election, and shall be repeated thereafter at least once each month. Either the mayor or two councilmen may call special meetings.

"All meetings of the council, whether regular or special, at which any person not a city officer is admitted, shall be open to the public."

At its first regular meeting the council selects one of the two councilmen as president of the council. During absence or inability of the mayor, he serves as mayor of the city. Normally the mayor will preside at meetings of the council.

"Every ordinance or resolution appropriating money or ordering any street improvement or sewer, or authorizing the making of any contract, or granting any franchise or right to occupy or use the streets, highways, bridges or public places of the city for any purpose, shall be complete in the form in which it is finally passed, and remain on file with the city clerk for public inspection for at least one week before the final passage."

But no franchise may be granted to any public service corporation, the law continues, without the proposition first being submitted at an election.

All officers of the city are prohibited from being interested directly or indirectly in any contract made by the city; even from accepting free transportation on a street car line. Policemen and firemen in uniform are excepted from this last rule, however.

SALE OF ALASKA EXPLAINED BY DISCOVERY

San Francisco, July 27.—The real reason why Russia sold Alaska to the United States revealed by records in the imperial archives at Petrograd was communicated to the American Historical association recently by Prof. Frank A. Golder of the Washington State college with the announcement that it was a new discovery.

According to Professor Golder, it has been assumed that Russia disposed of Alaska to prevent the territory from falling into the hands of England. From a year's study in the imperial archives and from documents furnished by him by the Russian ambassador at Washington he found, he said, that the sale was prompted by the desire of Russia to maintain friendly relations with the United States.

"Russia became convinced," said the professor, "that the manifest destiny of the United States was to become possessed of the Pacific coast of North America. Her statesmen discussed the probability that if gold should be discovered in Alaska Americans would rush there as they had to California. They foresaw trouble and believed that the United States might take Alaska anyway."

"To remove this danger they decided to sell Alaska to the United States. The price was no object. Russia would have taken much less than the \$7,200,000 she got, anything in fact, to transfer the territory and preserve the appearance of a sale."
