

### Base Ball Dope---Continued

In the fourth with only one man out and after Fly had hit a nifty single to center, Hanson hit right into an easy double play. French to Wolfer to Lodell. Hanson and Fly again figured in a somewhat similar mix-up in the seventh. Elder hit a red hot single to short and was safe at first. Fly then hit into exactly the same kind of a double and Hanson made the third out, French to Lodell.

One of Glendive's three very ticklish places was in the fifth. Mensor hit a high fly to Foss who misjudged it but caught the runner at third by a nice throw. Wolfer, the next batter, should have been an easy out, but Foss threw high and wide to Borrenson who missed the ball. Wolfer then stole second but Lamb fanned and French was out, Foss to Borrenson, thereby retiring the side.

The real feature of the game was the remarkable running catch made by Glendive's center fielder, Ben Dyer, when he speared Brown's long drive in left center in the sixth inning.

Glendive, in the eighth, missed another chance to score. Goldrick lead off with a fine Texas leaguer to right. Cavin flew out to Crawford. Nelson, who took Broderick's place at the bat as a pinch hitter, drew four balls and walked. Two men were now on bases and only one down. Thrasher, who batted in place of Borrenson, hit to third and Goldy was forced at third. Dyer then made the third out, Sutherland to Lodell.

#### MONDAY'S GAME

Monday's game, which was played before nearly 350 fans, proved conclusively that Glendive's star twirler, William Goldrick, doesn't have a peer today in the amateur ranks in the entire state of Montana. He pitched down Forsyth's much-heralded twirler to a stand-still, allowing but two hits to Finchner's nine; striking out nine batters to Finch's eight and allowing but two bases on balls to the Forsyth pitcher's three. Besides this he only hit one Forsyth batter while Finchner hit two Glendive men and he made two clean hits himself off his opponent while Finchner did not come within a mile of making a bingle.

Fifty automobiles lined the left field fence but the attendance was not nearly as large as such an important and interesting game surely warranted. There is one thing as sure and certain as the Dawson county rains, and that is if we do not get out and support these big games by our regular attendance, we cannot expect teams of Forsyth's calibre to play here.

#### How The Runs Were Made

Forsyth made its isolated tally on Foss's error in the first, the inning in which three of their men fanned the air on strikes. Mensor fanned. Lamb hit to Broderick who let the easy drive go through his legs. He then stole second, Hanson's throw to the sack being wild. Wolfer fanned out. French walked. Lodell hit an easy pop fly to Foss who almost got it and Lamb scored. Peterson retired the side by going the route of his predecessors.

Glendive secured its lead in the same inning. Dyer was safe at first on a slow grounder to French, taking second on the bad throw to Lodell. Foss walked and both runners advanced on Finchner's wild pitch to Brown. Elder bunted to first and was out. Hanson took first by being hit with a pitched ball and the bases were full. Goldy then dropped a bunt right in front of the home plate and Dyer was forced out. Felix Fly, the Sioux, then hit a peach of a single over second and Foss and Hanson scored. Cavin then hit to French who forced Fly at second, French to Wolfer.

We made our third run in the lucky seventh. Dyer beat out a grounder to short. Foss sacrificed to first. Elder biffed out his second single in the same place and Dyer scored from second. Elder then took third on Hanson's nifty Texas leaguer to center, but both runners died on bases when Goldy fanned and Fly flew out to left.

The real feature of the game was Goldrick's brainy pitching and the incidental attractions were Thrasher being almost knocked out in the second inning by a pitched ball which hit him in the left arm near the elbow, and Glen Hall being knocked unconscious in the ninth by being hit on the forehead above the left eye by a ball batted by Brown into the rosters brigade near the first base line. Other features which must not be overlooked were Thrasher's acrobatic circus catch of Goldy's throw in the third on French's out, the tall first-sacker nabbing the pellet in a comfortable sitting position; and Sid's great catch of Crawford's high foul in the seventh, both plays being loudly applauded.

Up to the fourth inning Finchner had been using a licorice ball, Umpire Wagner making him cut it out from that time on.

Forsyth came nearest to scoring in the fourth when, with two men on bases and only one out, Foss muffed Broderick's easy throw of Crawford's liner but recovered it in time to get him out, Sid failing to touch Lodell who was running to third at the time. Finchner was then out, Foss to Thrasher and the fans breathed easier.

Two bad plays were pulled off in the eighth. Thrasher was caught sound asleep off first and Cavin was out by a mile when he tried to steal third with two men out.
