December 26th to January 1st  
The low barometric area appearing over the Pacific coast about Christmas day will have moved over the Rocky Mountains by Sunday, the 26th, central Mississippi valley about the 27th, eastern states and Atlantic coast about the 28th and 29th.

This storm will be preceded by rising temperatures reaching Rocky Mountain region about Christmas day, central valleys about Sunday or Monday and eastern sections about the 27th or 28th.

Rains in the southern states and snows in the north will be plentiful at this time and heavy sleet, with blizzardous conditions will, in all probability, have to be reckoned with by many line companies as well as railroads.

Following close in the wake of this storm area the temperature will drop rapidly and quite decidedly to very low levels for this month. The northern states from the Atlantic ocean to Rocky Mountains will feel the severest effects of this cold, very likely, the worst of the month. The climax of these low temperatures will occur before the middle of the week.

About Wednesday the 29th conditions will warm up on the western coast due to the influence of another area of very low barometer. The center, or area of lowest atmospheric pressure will appear over western states about the 30th, move to the Plains states by the last day of December and Mississippi valley about New Year's day, 1916.

As this storm passes over the country, heavy snow, high winds, sleet

and blizzards will visit northern sections with heavy rains in southern states.

These storms will be followed by increasing cold.

The year 1915 ends with severe storms in the Lake region and eastern states and intense cold over western regions.
