### SPRAY OF THE FALLS.

No trace of the snow is left. Phil Gibson shot two fine wild geese to-day.

The track-layers are now considerably beyond Dodge on the Montana Central.

The soft wind has cleared away the snow and enabled building operations to flourish once more.

The time tables have been prepared for the Great Falls trains which may begin running on Monday or Tuesday next. The start has been delayed because the weather prevented surfacing.

Sidewalk building goes on actively and there are fair prospects that there will be continuous walks on either side along Central avenue. On First avenue also much progress has been made.

Sam Dodd has taken charge of sheep that are awaiting shipment. The Manitoba campaign is preparing to have stockyards of its own. Supt. Shields says that work was begun on them to-day.

When these matters are adjusted the finance committee will be able to give a full account of their stewardship.

There will be a grand rally at the public school entertainment which will be given to-morrow (Friday) evening in the Kingsbury block. The programme will include music, singing, recitations, forming altogether a splendid display of local talent. The entire proceeds will be used for the benefit of the school, which is greatly in need of reference books as well as of a small library. It is expected that everyone who was once a boy or girl will be present and that the spacious hall will be crowded to its full capacity.

### The New School.

Jessie Rich of Helena has been engaged as assistant teacher in the Great Falls schools. Miss Rich has taught for some time in the Helena public schools and other places and is very highly recommended as an accomplished and efficient

teacher by the best judges of school work in Helena. The new school will probably commence October 31, next Monday. Miss McBrine will have charge of the higher grade in the Lapeyre building and Miss Rich of the primary school in the old school-house.

### The Cascade County Books.

Mr. Wegner, the county commissioner elect of Cascade county, had the pleasure of awarding last evening the contract for record books to the lowest bidder—the Journal Publishing Company of Helena. The prize was thus carried off by a home establishment in competition with leading houses from Grand Forks, St. Paul and St. Louis. Mr. Boos, who is in town was naturally gratified at the result which gives satisfaction to all concerned as the proceedings were marked by fairness and good humor.

### Money in Sheep.

William Logan the Judith Basin sheep man is in town after a load of wire. Mr. Logan is fencing his fine hay ranch of 480 acres on Trout creek. There are not many stockmen who are as well fixed to stand off a hard winter as he is. His band is a good example of what can be done with a few sheep, as he started five years ago with 200 ewes, and now has a fine band of over 2,000 sheep. Economy and hard work did the business.—Billings Gazette.

### Struck by a Rock.

BUTTE, October 26.—Monday afternoon about 3 o'clock while John Payne, timber man at the Parot mine was laying timber, a rock weighing about a pound, fell down the main way and struck him on the left side of the head, crushing in the skull. It is supposed the rock fell a distance of about fifty feet, having been loosened by the swaying of the ropes. Some hopes of his recovery are expressed.

### HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Boiled potatoes ought to be laid out on a plate, and are then as good for frying or mashing as if they were freshly cooked. If left heaped up they will often spoil in one night.

To brighten furniture and remove spots, take two tablespoonsful of sweet oil, one tablespoonful of vinegar, half a tablespoonful of turpentine. Use with a bit of flannel.

Gingham and calico dresses should be ironed on the wrong side to produce the lustreless effect seen in the new material before it has been laundered.

A half cup ammonia to a pail of warm water will cleanse hard finished walls nicely; of course the water should be changed when much soiled.
