The Anacostia Shut Down.

HELENA, Dec. 31.—It was reported at Anacostia yesterday that the fires at the smelter are banked and that it would remain closed down for ten days. The difficulty for lack of coal is not confined to the Anacostia company. Mr. Williams of the Colorado Concentrator said he would have to shut down his works if the supply of coal there is not materially increased today. Mr. Bowman of the Little Bird was in town to see if the Montana Central would not allow the Montana Central engines to haul to the Little Bird a supply of wood that it needs badly.

The Vanderbilt Road.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—At the semi-annual meeting of the directors of the Lake Shore road it was decided to raise the annual dividends from four to five per cent. Accordingly the regular semi-annual dividend of two per cent was declared. The other Vanderbilt roads declared the same dividends. In all dividends were declared by the Vanderbilts on nearly \$190,000,000.

The Tacoma Leader Burned.

TACOMA, W. T., Dec. 27.—The office of the Tacoma Leader was burned early yesterday morning. The fire was the work of an incendiary, as no fire was in the building and none of the force there, it being a holiday for the hands. The paper had been making a vigorous fight against gamblers and disreputable persons. A reward of \$1,000 is offered by the proprietor for the detection of the incendiary. The editorial rooms and all the library files were destroyed. Loss, \$75,000. The paper will appear as usual in the morning and the office will be rebuilt at once.

Opposing the Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—The Evening Star says the democrats of the house are preparing themselves for another discussion of tariff before this congress expires. The clerks to the ways and means committee have been set to work to get up information relating to the senate bill, part of which is for the use of senators attacking between January 2d and 31st, and part for the house a little later on. Preparations are active for a determined fight on the bill in the senate, within the limited time for debate given.

Paid in Full.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—The comptroller of the currency has declared a final dividend of 30 per cent and interest in favor of the Second National bank of Reno, O., making in all 100 per cent, and interest in full, on claims proved amounting to \$200,207. This bank failed May 2 last.

Mass Sullivan Resigns Again.

BOSTON, Dec. 31.—Martin Sullivan, a life prisoner at the state prison, was liberated Thursday, having been pardoned by the governor and council. Twenty-seven years ago Sullivan was sentenced to imprisonment for life for highway robbery of an extremely outrageous nature. He is 58 years old.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 31.—Advance sheets of the annual report of the minister of customs show that the exports of Canada during the fiscal year ending June were \$290,870,000, and the imports \$111,000,000, the largest balance of trade against Canada since the dominion was formed.

Bayne, an old member of the Pennsylvania delegation, who worships before the throne of Mr. Blaine and is always fighting Cameron. Bayne has been making up to Quay lately and it is well known toward the head of the Pennsylvania procession at present. He probably is seeking a good committee.

EXECUTION OF PRADO.

How the French Murderer Was Led to the Gallows.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—Prado, the murderer of Marie Augustin's mistress, was guillotined this morning. He preserved a firm demeanor to the last, refusing to confess and declined the services of a chaplain. An immense crowd collected around the prison last night and remained until Prado had been executed. The public spent the time in singing comic songs and amusing themselves in other boisterous ways. Prado slept well until 6 o'clock and protested his innocence of the murder of Marie Augustin to the last, and declared against the injustice of this world. He refused to disclose his real name. When the fallor came to pluck his limbs he offered no resistance and while they were engaged in this operation he shed one tear. The execution was witnessed by 200 artists, newspaper men, actors, lawyers and politicians, who possessed influence to obtain admission within the city lines. In fifty seconds from Prado's appearance at the prison gate his bleeding head lay in a basket. Prado, in walking from the prison to the guillotine showed no sign of fear. His arms were tightly plaited behind his back and his heavy locks, seen to such advantage in the court room, were gone. In front of the guillotine a board stood upright to the height of five feet and as Prado neared the board a most dreadful series of incidents followed, each other with the rapidity of lightning. The trembling abbe stepped apart and four burly men dressed in blouses of blue, who had not been seen before, sprang forward, seized the condemned man and laid him on his back against the upright board and then knelt themselves upon him and by their weight bore the struggling victim face downward to the guillotine. The board was raised and he lay on rollers and in an instant it had been wheeled forward until the prisoner's neck was under the glistering knife. The knife was sprung and the head fell and struck his neck as it might have collided with a rubber car spring. It went through and the head of Prado lay among the shavings beyond.
