SPOTTED HORSE SOLD TO HELENA PARTIES.

LEWIS, May 2.—P. W. McAdow, the owner of the Spotted Horse mine, writes from Madden Tuesday to the Argus saying that "the mine is sold for \$500,000 and the parties will take possession about the 20th of May." The company is composed of thorough mining men and has millions at their command. The ore strikes in the Spotted Horse are large and strong and it will undoubtedly be the best gold producer in Montana if not in the northwest. He says also that there is good coal near Madden. The mine is a lime formation. The ore is, in part, of a dark blue color, carrying abundance of free gold. Other ore found in the mine is of ferruginous character, carrying sulphurets of gold. The mine is well developed by shafts and tunnels. It has been known hitherto as the mine of the Judith mountains.

A. M. HOLLER AND M. E. DOWNS,

the former president of the Maginnis mining company, the latter financial agent of the Jay Gould mining company, were in Madden last week inspecting the Spotted Horse and Maginnis mines. It is the Jay Gould company who have bought the mine. That company will also it is said absorb the Maginnis company, and operate the whole group of mines around Gould hill. Mr. Downs spent several days taking battery samples, etc., at the mill and measuring ore in the mine, leaving for Helena Monday. He reports ore enough in sight to yield a large portion, if not all, of the purchase money. It is expected that the Jay Gould people will begin operations about May 20. It is their intention to overhaul and enlarge the prospect mill immediately, to put up twenty stamps, an air compressor, sink a shaft at the mine several hundred feet, and develop the property in every way.

Eastern Nevada Range.

The Reno Gazette says: Reports that come from the eastern part of the state are very discouraging. The water of Rock and Willow creeks in the Tuscarora county is completely choked out and the cattle are said to be dying in great numbers for want of the necessary fluid. Rock creek, a large trout stream, is said to be entirely dry. Cattlemen, that is, large holders, are driving the cattle over the ridge to the draining of the Missouri and Columbia rivers. PARKS ACCEPTED.

THE CITY COUNCIL RECEIVES WITH PLEASURE THE LIBERAL OFFER. The Old Board Wins up its Business and Makes Way for the Other. The Treasurer's Report Received.

The final meeting of the present board of aldermen was held last evening. Acting Mayor Fairfield presided and Aldermen Johnson, Hotchkiss, Matthews, Beachley, Wegner and Dickinson. The minutes having been read and approved, a petition was presented for a sidewalk on the east side of Third street from Central avenue to Second avenue South. Referred. The following report was made by the special committee on parks:

W. F. Fairfield, a special committee appointed by your honor, to consider and report on accepting a proposed park of the president of the Great Falls Water Power & Traction company of a donation to the city of two small parks donated to the city of two small parks, north west of Central avenue, lying between the Missouri river and the town line. We deem it of great benefit to the health of our people to have such resorts, which will also benefit all property holders. These parks will beautify our city and will increase in value as each year rolls by. We recommend that the very liberal offer be accepted by your honorable body and that a park committee be appointed to keep said parks in good order and beautify the same so as to be a credit to our city. On motion of Alderman Wegner, seconded by Alderman Beachley, the city treasurer was directed to collect from property owners any sums which they owe for sidewalks.

Reference was made to the frame addition which Mr. Wernicke is building. It was explained that he intends to cover it with sheet iron, but it was held that he should have obtained a permit for the building.

Alderman Johnson spoke of some defective sidewalks. This closed the business of the board which adjourned.




