

TWO SPLENDID SPEECHES.

Governor Toole and Hon. W. D. Hill Address an Immense Audience.

CAMPAIGN ISSUES ABLY DISCUSSED.

Mr. Hill Treats of the Tariff Question in an Entertaining and Exhaustive Manner.

Governor Toole Shows up Carter's Silver Record and Scores the Political Conspirators of Last Year.

The democratic rally at the Park hotel Wednesday was the greatest success of the campaign. The people turned out in masses to honor Gov. Toole and Hon. W. D. Hill, and notwithstanding the fact that the republicans had a meeting elsewhere in the city, the spacious dining room of the Park hotel was filled to overflowing with an intelligent and enthusiastic audience.

In a few well chosen words Mr. McCord introduced the first speaker, Hon. W. D. Hill of Ohio, who delivered one of the most able and interesting speeches ever heard in Great Falls. He won the good favor of the audience from the beginning and was followed closely and listened to attentively as he traced the history of the tariff legislation in the United States and proceeded to demonstrate the evil effects of the high protective system inaugurated and maintained by the republican party.

Assays from ore taken from the Palmetto lead on Phipps creek, owned by Dick Harlow and J. J. McLaughlin, show the following results: Sample No. one, 118 silver and 46 in gold; sample No. two, 130 silver and 89 in gold. As the ore is from near the surface and the lead is very large, the result is entirely satisfactory to the owners. Mr. Earle, of the smelter, expressed a good opinion of the ore in making his return of the assays.

A recent assay of ore taken from the Cornucopia Mining company's property at Nelhart gives the following result: No. 1 iron oxides, silver, 52 ozs.; gold, 43 ozs.; No. 2 pyrites, 24 ozs. silver and 30 ozs. gold. No. 3 pyrites, 12 ozs. silver and 145 ozs. gold. From the same property as follows: No. 1 iron oxides, silver, 130 ozs.; gold, 24 ozs.; No. 2 pyrites, 136 ozs.; gold, 92 ozs.; No. 3 pyrites, 164 ozs. silver. The treasury stock of this company was placed on the market a few weeks ago at 1 1/2 cents. Sales were made within the last few days at fifteen and is now held at twenty-five cents.

"We want to keep the tariff up until the manufacturers are able to compete with the markets of the world," remarked a young McKinleyite yesterday. This has been the republican policy for 30 years. M. A. Arnold today shipped 31 cars of cattle from Big Sandy for Chicago. A train load was also shipped from Markas by the Silver Live Stock Co., Com. Kolars and Nielsen & Coburn.

A party of noted sportsmen arrived from Helena last evening, consisting of Governor Hanson, Dr. E. K. Cook, E. F. Fisk and Sam and Percy Kramert. The party had two weeks ago, on which occasion, together with Tom Twid and another hunter, they bagged over 200 geese and ducks in the Lost Lake region.

Nathan Trentler, a Crow half-breed, was yesterday brought up from Big Sandy by Constable Humbley, and placed in the county jail charged with horse stealing. Trentler was held in \$1000 bonds and committed by Justice Rickard, of Big Sandy, before whom he waived examination last Saturday. The theft occurred Friday night and the animal belonged to Ed. Whitcraft, of Wheatland. A cowboy in the employ of Whitcraft, had left the horse tied to a hitching post near the Big Sandy depot. On the morning of the theft Trentler, of Trentler, Handley at once started after him and overtook him at a half-breed camp on Box Elder, ten miles from Sandy, and also recovered the horse.
