CLEVELAND AND SILVER.
 He is interviewed by State Treasurer Stephens of Missouri on the Subject.

NON-COMMITTAL ON THE QUESTION.
 He Thinks the People Should be Educated Concerning the Metal Before 1892.

Confesses His Opinions Have Undergone Changes Since the Passage of the Coinage Law.

New York, April 21.—The Telegram prints the following: "State Treasurer Stephens of Missouri called on ex-President Grover Cleveland today with letters of introduction from Gov. Francis and other leading Missouri democrats. The object of the visit was to secure from ex-President Cleveland a more thorough expression of his views on the silver question than the latter has so far made public; also for his reason for having written his silver letter to the Reform club. The ex-president received Stephens very cordially. The treasurer explained that the Missouri democrats were now opposed to Cleveland on account of his silver letter, and asked him why he wrote that letter. "I was well aware," said the ex-president, "that the republican party is very desirous of making the silver question one of the leading issues of the campaign of 1892, and the question should be taken up at once. It should be thoroughly discussed so that the people can be educated up to it. In this way it may be settled before 1892 and we will not be endangered by a divided party. Besides, I was daily in receipt of hundreds of letters from democrats in all parts of the country asking that I give an expression regarding free coinage. I felt that these friends were entitled to know how I stood on the question and so I took the first favorable opportunity to give my views. Since I did so I have received a large mail from all over the country thanking me for having done so. My correspondents say the party had a right to know my views, and that I would not have acted in good faith if I had kept them secret. If I have caused a thorough discussion of the subject among democrats they must admit that I acted wisely."

"But now that the letter has been written, Missouri democrats," said Stevens, "would like to know in case you are elected in 1892 and a democratic congress should pass a free coinage bill, would you veto it, no matter if you knew that a great majority of your party favored the measure?" "If I should be elected president in 1892," answered the ex-president, "such a bill would not reach me until December, 1893. So that this is a bridge which I would better not attempt to cross until we come to it. What would be had for the country at the present time might be a benefit then. The amount of the present per capita should be increased, but changes should be made gradually. When the law was passed providing for the coinage of \$2,000,000 per month I feared the result for I thought it would prove an injury to the business interests of the country for a time at least. However, the law proved a benefit, in my opinion, the country was ready for the change. When the present law providing for \$4,000,000 per month was passed I thought the measure too radical and it might have the effect of driving gold out of the country, but I was mistaken. Both those opposed as well as those in favor of free coinage believe the present law is a wise one in so far that the country has benefited by it. With the rapid strikes the country is making it is impossible to say what financial measure we may be ready for in 1894." In framing my views upon the subject I did not alone consider the interests of any one section of this country. I have been unable to see how free coinage could fail to be an injury to every section of this country, believing it would drive gold out of circulation. As we were and are in a great measure dependant on the European market for our products, we are obliged to take them into consideration.

"When I have suggested a monetary conference of representatives of other governments with our own which could agree upon a new standard of value my suggestions have been scoffed at by Europeans. I am delighted that the people are now engaged in such thoughtful consideration of the question and by 1892 they will have decided whether or not we are ready to handle all the silver of the world."

"Stephens gave an account of his visit to the ex-president shortly after leaving Cleveland. He took no notes, but he thinks he thoroughly memorized what Cleveland said. A representative of the associated press called at Cleveland's office this afternoon to ascertain whether the interview as given above was accurate. Cleveland said he had not talked with any one on the silver question, for publication. He had read the Telegram's article and could not therefore say whether the statements credited to him were accurate expressions of his views or not.
