SENATOR GIBSON'S VIEWS. Great Falls in Good Favor East.—Exceedingly Bright Prospects for This City. Senator Paris Gibson although under the charge of a physician, during his sojourn in the east, was not at any time forgetful of Great Falls and he is likely to have something of interest to say at the meeting of the Board of Trade this afternoon. He spent some time in New York, Boston, Chicago, St. Paul and Minneapolis, and at each of these places found that much interest is manifested in this young and vigorous city. "It is surprising," said Mr. Gibson, "to note the interest taken in Great Falls in those great cities. Wherever I went I found people anxious to gain information about this city, and those who have investments here or have at some time visited the city invariably expressed the utmost confidence in the future of the town. This thing was so general that I came to the natural conclusion that the people of New York, Boston, and other eastern cities have a better opinion of Great Falls than her own citizens. Of all the places I visited I would say Boston is first in regard to the Cataract city. As you know, there is already a great deal of Boston capital invested here, and if read the indications aright a beginning in that direction has hardly been made. I had an excellent opportunity of forming an opinion on this subject, and can say to you that many influential citizens of Boston are taking a lively interest in Great Falls; and the same is true, while perhaps not in as great a degree, in all the financial and trade centers I visited."

If such a thing is possible, Mr. Gibson is more enthusiastic than ever over the prospects of Great Falls. He learned at the Boston office of the B. & M. company that work on the smelter here is to be pushed with all possible rapidity. He gives the highest importance to the fact that the Boston & Montana is to build a mammoth refinery and thinks the time is near at hand when all the copper of Montana will be refined at this place, where power without limit can be secured at a minimum of cost. Electricity is the great factor in this process and at no place in the world can it be generated cheaper than here. Without speaking by authority he expressed the belief that the Anaconda refinery would be located at Great Falls. As to the Butte & Boston, he said that company will certainly build their new smelter at this place. If there is a marked improvement in the copper market they may begin operations this season and assuredly work on this great plant will be under way next spring.

"While the prospects for these and other great enterprises are very encouraging," said the senator, "we should not lose sight of small things. Great Falls is to be a manufacturing as well as a smelting city and no efforts should be spared to induce manufacturers to locate with us. Greater opportunities are presented to them here than in any other city of the northwest and we should keep this fact before the public. The Board of Trade and our citizens generally should be alive to the importance of this matter."

A Cowboy on the Rampage. Any old timers who happened to be on Central avenue about 10:30 yesterday morning saw a sight which was quite common in Benton or Miles City fifteen or twenty years ago. Mounted on a nery broncho was an alleged specimen of the genus cowboy, who, evidently the worse for liquor, urged the animal up and down the main thoroughfare of the city at a headlong gait. He made frequent attempts at the well known cowboy yell, but anyone familiar with that class of people could readily see he was tenderfoot trying to pass off for a bad man. Sheriff Hamilton, who was going to the depot to take the train for Butte, yelled at the drunken fool to halt, but the command was unheeded. The officer was carrying a small satchel and as the fellow didn't stop, he threw the grip at him. It struck him on the head causing him to reel a little to one side so that the onlookers thought he was going to fall. He quickly regained his seat, and with another yell started for the north side of town. The police had by this time concluded to put a stop to the exhibition of rowdism, and Officer Wright, borrowing a horse of Charles Dickinson, started after the bad man. He captured him on Fourth avenue, and when placed in jail he gave the name of Bebee. He will be tried today.

PAUL, June 24.—A Pioneer Press Missoula special says: About midnight last night a fire broke out in the business portion of Demersville, the metropolis of the Flathead country, and burned about a dozen business houses. The loss is estimated at \$30,000 to \$40,000; insurance, light.

DISASTROUS STORMS. Iowa Seared in One Place and Flooded in Another. WATERLOO, Iowa, June 24.—Reports continue to arrive here confirmatory of the disastrous storm and flood along the Illinois Central. Cherokee was visited by another storm this morning fully as disastrous, though not of so long duration as last night. The Illinois Central railroad bridge, about 250 feet long, across the Little Sioux at Cherokee went down under the rush of the flood at 2:15 this afternoon, together with several houses in the lower part of the town. Reports of the drowning of four persons at Cherokee and four at Correctionville are confirmed by a dispatch from Gilles, superintendent of the Iowa division, who is at the scene of the disaster. Aurelia and Cherokee both report another storm breaking at 4:30 p. m.
