The Benton Group.
The Montana Gold, Silver, Platinum and Telurium mine at Neihart, known as the Benton group is regarded by many as the most promising mine in Montana. It embraces eight full claims 600x1,500 feet in extent and it is said to contain over forty distinct leads. The first vein struck in the mine by a cross-cut tunnel that is being driven to cut a number of leads that appear on the surface has been drifted on over five hundred feet north and south, has a wind down fifty feet with a tunnel over one hundred feet long at the bottom of the winz, all the way on the lead. The work develops an unbroken ore chute over 500 feet long. At the north end of the drift the lead is over three feet in width and nearly one-half of it will average from \$400 to \$1,000 per ton, while in the face of the tunnel on the lower level there is five feet of ore that will average over \$200 per ton. The rich pay streak is continuous throughout the workings and averages in width from four inches to fourteen and the ore shipments have never yielded less than \$400 per ton.—Husbandman.

THE CHOTEAU COUNTRY.
Some Interesting Notes of That Region by the Tribune Traveler.
CHOTEAU, Sept. 1.—Choteau is a pleasant and enterprising town situated on the Teton river about fifty miles northwest of Great Falls in the center of a widely known cattle and sheep region. The population is perhaps 300, but it does an immense business with the surrounding ranchers and the country that lies between it and the mountains. The town was founded some ten years ago and is very beautifully situated. It is supplied with pure, clear water from the Teton which rises in the mountains and is teeming with the speckled trout so much sought after.
Choteau has an enterprising newspaper the Montanian—two good hotels, three general stores, two blacksmith shops, five saloons, two butcher shops and a fine school building. Everything has the appearance of push and enterprise. One can better judge of the business done here when it is known that the stores here carry stocks of from \$50,000 to \$70,000 and have goods freighted in every day.
The town has a very good school, employing two teachers and having school ten months in the year. What is most noted on arriving here is the fine green lawns, shaded by trees, and surrounded by fences, giving the appearance of refinement and comfort.
One thing needed here is a bank. All the large ranch owners and the merchants also have their money deposited in the Great Falls or Helena banks and pay their obligations by means of checks. Sometimes it is almost impossible to do business here on account of absence of currency to cash the checks.
The Teton valley is a rest to the eyes after staging it over the prairies from the Missouri. Its valley, which is several miles wide, and its numerous branches furnish some of the best grazing lands in Montana. Some of these valleys are supplied with irrigating ditches and agriculture is carried on with great success, wheat, oats, barley and vegetables being the principal products. The wheat and oats are being harvested at present and the yield will be very large. The crops have been grown this year without irrigation. The grain grew tall and stands thick upon the ground and is well filled. It is thought the wheat will yield 40 bushels and the oats 70 or 80 bushels per acre. Large quantities of hay are being cut this year; the grass never was better. The ranchmen are determined that the winter will catch them with sufficient feed again.
The Sands Land & Cattle company and the Clark ranch are immense concerns in the cattle and sheep business here. The Sands Land & Cattle company's ranch consists of several thousand acres in a few miles of the city, fenced in and the Teton river flowing through it. This company is engaged principally in the cattle business. The Clark ranch is further up the river and is devoted to sheep raising. It covers a large scope of country and is stocked with more than 40,000 sheep. These are divided into large herds on different parts of the ranch and are in communication with headquarters and each other by telephone and 38 miles of wire.
A very noticeable thing here and one of vast importance, were it situated in other places, is the millions upon millions of loads of the finest gravel scattered along Gravel Bottom creek. There is enough to gravel all the streets in Montana for a hundred years.
The citizens here are very desirous of a division of Choteau county and have some hopes of accomplishing this result the next session of the legislature. After this is expected a railway and Choteau, the county seat and metropolis, will enjoy a substantial boom. TRAVELER.
