**A Serious Insurrection.**  
TIENTSIN, Nov. 25.—The outbreak in the north, officially described as a raid of Mongolian robbers, proves to be an insurrectionary movement of serious dimensions. Dispatches received today state that in Mongolia and some northern districts nearer the capital the revolutionary feeling is spreading and the number of robbers is becoming alarming. The insurgent force, consisting of several squadrons of Mongolian cavalry, several squadrons of Chinese infantry, is reported advancing on Peking, where the utmost alarm prevails. The population of a large area, actuated partly by inclination and partly by fear of the rebel soldiery, joined the movement, together with several mandarins. Imperial troops started to meet the rebels. The entire Christian population of King Chou was massacred with Belgian priests.

**A Dangerous Counterfeit Current.**  
INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 25.—The secret service officers have been notified that one of the most dangerous counterfeits ever issued is in circulation. It is a photographic counterfeit of the \$20 gold certificate, check letter A, B, K, Bruce, Register, and James Gillilan, Treasurer. Its department series is A372945. The notice describes the counterfeit as photographically perfect in its lines, but in its color it is distinguishable from the genuine. The back of the counterfeit bill is a light brown while the genuine is orange. The counterfeit is one-half inch narrower than the genuine. The paper is of good quality and contains the threads which so long baffled the skill of the counterfeiters.

**The Elliott Murder Case.**  
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 25.—The case of P. J. Elliott, indicted for the murder of A. C. Osborn, Feb. 23, last, was called in the common pleas court today and continued to Monday, when the work of securing the jury will begin.

**Murdered With a Cleaver.**  
NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Robert Lyons, a butcher 28 years of age, was brutally murdered early this evening in his shop by Michael Sliney. The weapon used was a cleaver. Sliney and Lyons were believed to be the best of friends.

**North Dakota's Editor-Senator.**  
No one who knew Hansbrough when he was in San Francisco twelve years ago ever dreamed he would fetch up in the United States senate. Hansbrough filled the telegraph editor's desk on The Chronicle for many months, and he was a rattling good editor of news, besides being an expert on local writing. At that time the newspapers here got only a light telegraphic service, because the overland wires were in poor condition and the rates extremely heavy. Probably 5,000 words a night was an average report. Under these conditions it was necessary to add any descriptive matter that would supplement a dispatch, and also to make an attractive head. Hansbrough was an artist in this kind of work.

Once, when Alexander II made a wholesale sweep of a lot of nihilists, shooting several and exiling the remainder to Siberia, Hansbrough headed the rather lurid report of Russian imperial cruelty as "Czar-Saparilla." Work at a desk, however, proved too monotonous for Hansbrough, and finally, in 1879, he conceived the idea of taking an educated Chinese to the east on a lecture trip. Hansbrough hired Hull, the most accomplished newspaper "fakir" on the coast, who made Denis Kearney famous by writing his said lot speeches, to prepare the lecture, and it was a very entertaining one.

The east didn't bite as Hansbrough expected, and the lecture outfit went to pieces somewhere between Chicago and New York. Then Hansbrough went to Iowa and started a paper. When the Dakota boom started, he saw his opportunity, and now he is reaping the fruits of it. He may not know as much about law or parliamentary procedure as many other senators, but there are few in that body who have more general information than Hansbrough.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

**One of Perry's Vessels.**  
An important relic of the war of 1812 has just been unearthed at Ferrysburg. It is the lower portion of the hull of the sloop Porepine, one of the nine small vessels built by Commodore Perry on Lake Erie, and with which he achieved his great victory over the British squadron, known in American history as Perry's victory, Perry's nine vessels consisting of the Lawrence, his flagship, of twenty guns; the Niagara, twenty guns

the Caecilia, three guns; schooner Ariel, four; the Scorpion, two; the Sommers, of two guns and two swivels; the sloop Trip, Tigress and Porcupine, one gun each.

The Porcupine was taken to Detroit, where, in 1830, her upper works were rebuilt and her name changed to Caroline. Eventually she was brought to Grand Haven and sailed by Captain Harry Miller. In the early fifties she was set adrift in Grand river near the mouth. The current carried her out into Lake Michigan, but a west wind blew her back in a day or two, and she was afterward refitted and sailed a season or two. Finally, about the year 1855, she was allowed to sink, head on, at Ferrysburg. Her remains will be taken from the water and properly cared for.—Grand Rapids Democrat.


