

STILL DOUBTFUL.

But the Indications Point to the Glorious Result of

Grover Cleveland's Election as President of the United States.

Great Democratic Gains in all Doubtful States.

Indiana, New Jersey and Connecticut Probably Democratic.

Even Wisconsin and Michigan Tremble in the Balance.

New York the Pivotal State of the Union and Still Doubtful.

ELECTION NOTES.

From Wednesday's Daily. Returns from the national election as received in this week of election are meagre but may be presumed to contain something of the gist of all the news that is so freely floating and so eagerly seized throughout the Union.

To sum up the whole matter down to a single sentence: New York will decide the election and New York is still in doubt. But we believe that the Empire state, when full returns are in, will show herself solid for the man to whom she gave 196,000 majority two years ago and in that event Grover Cleveland, the candidate of the democracy, will be our next president.

Connecticut and New Jersey have gone democratic; Indiana has very probably done the same; Michigan and Wisconsin have given such democratic gains as to give rise to the reasonable hope that even they have wheeled into line; even Minnesota has cut down Garfield's majority. Can it be possible that New York has swept away 196,000 majority for Cleveland in 1882 and beside given his opponent the greater vote? It does not appear probable and we cannot yet believe it will prove true.

Below we give a synopsis of such returns as have been received. In to-morrow's issue we hope to be able to announce Cleveland's election.

CLEVELAND'S ELECTION CONCEDED. A telegram went over the wires this morning from Vice-President Oakes, of the Northern Pacific at St. Paul, to S. T. Hauser of Helena, saying: "The St. Paul Pioneer Press of this morning concedes Cleveland's election."

TEXAS. Indications point to the election of every democratic congressman.

INDIANA. New York, 11.06 p. m. 4th.—The Herald says all returns from Indiana show democratic gains.

It is believed that Indiana has given Cleveland a small majority, though the state is still in doubt.

OREGON. Blaine's majority in this state will exceed 1,500.

MASSACHUSETTS. 10.26 p. m. 4th.—One hundred and thirty seven towns and cities in the state, including 102 of the 107 precincts in Boston show Blaine 59,889, Cleveland 50,820, Butler 8,164, St. John 4,091.

WISCONSIN. Seventy-four scattering towns and precincts in this state give a net democratic gain of 1,563.

GEORGIA. Entire democratic congressional ticket elected.

MAR. LAND. Indications point to 10,000 majority in this state for Cleveland.

ILLINOIS. Chicago, 4 a. m. 5th.—Outside of Cook county 308 precincts show a democratic gain of 7,181. Returns very meagre. It is claimed that the democrats carry 2nd, 3rd and 15th congressional districts and republicans the 10th, 11th and 16th. Carter Harrison is probably defeated for governor.

LOUISIANA. The democrats claim the state by 20,000 majority and all congressmen. The republicans admit defeat on presidential vote but claim congressmen in 2nd and 3rd districts.

MINNESOTA. St. Paul 11:10 a. m. 5th.—Returns are coming in slowly. Indications point to a great reduction of Garfield's majority in the state which was 37,321. Donnelly (democratic) is gaining on Strait in the 3rd district. Gillilan, Wilson, Wakefield and White are probably elected in the other districts.

NEW YORK. Corrected returns in New York city show Cleveland's majority in city to be 58,083. The Evening Journal of Albany says the congressional delegation will stand 37 democratic to 17 republicans. The New York Tribune claims that Cleveland's majority in the city will be less than 30,000.

Albany, 1:17 a. m.—Returns indicate election of the entire democratic ticket; 268 districts outside of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 187,000, Cleveland 158,000, Butler 5,000, St. John 10,000. Net democratic gain 6,900.

New York 5th.—Indications at this hour (4:30 a. m.) are that republicans have carried New York by 6,000 plurality.

Indiana by about 5,000 plurality. Democrats have carried New Jersey by about 1,100 and Connecticut by about 1,500 plurality.

New York 2:30 p. m. 5th.—Associated Press reports this afternoon say that the republican gains outside of New York and Brooklyn are sufficient to overcome the democratic majorities in those cities and to give the republicans 11,000 to spare in New York State. This estimate is contingent upon future returns being as favorable as those now being received. The New York World claims that New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Indiana and probably Michigan and Wisconsin are for Cleveland and that he is elected.

NEW JERSEY. The Trenton Times concedes that Cleveland has carried the state by a majority of from one to two thousand.

MICHIGAN. Both the republicans and the fusionists (democrats and greenbackers) are claiming the state by small majorities. The vote is close either way.

FLORIDA. The entire electoral, congressional and state republican tickets have been elected in this state for the first time since 1876 (did it go republican then?). This is due to electoral disagreements.

CLEVELAND CONGRATULATED. This morning Cleveland received many telegrams from prominent democrats of New York state, congratulating him upon his election. This looks as though they thought he was safe.

LOCAL AND TERRITORIAL.

A Close Fight in Livingston and all over the Territory.

The Election of Almost Every Man on the County Ticket in Doubt.

The Unexpected Influence Brought Against Toole May Defeat Him.

Returns from the county precincts came in very slowly, and at this writing it would not be safe to prophesy the election of any of the county candidates except perhaps T. P. McDonald (and that is uncertain), Miss Hamilton and Dr. Alton. Unexpectedly the Northern Pacific vote of the whole territory, went strongly against Toole and his chances for election are by no means certain, though we have great confidence that he will be successful. In the precinct R. W. Hanson, (dem.) has been elected one of justice of the peace, while Kelly (ind.) and Redfield (rep.) are tie for the second. Wimet (dem.) and Cornwell (rep. were) elected constables, and Lenihan (dem.) road supervisor.

TIMBERLINE. Timberline polled 225 votes. Blakeley received a majority of 10; Toole a majority of 17, and Armstrong a majority of 20.

YELLOWSTONE COUNTY. Special to the Enterprise. BILLINGS, 2:55 p. m., 5th.—It is estimated that Hiram Knowles is delegate in congress has carried the county by a majority of 55. Billings gave Toole a majority of 8 and for district attorney gave Blake (republican) a majority of 30. Ramsey and King, both republicans, are running close for sheriff with chances in favor of King. J. D. Finn, democratic nominee for sheriff, is defeated. King was on a tax-payers' ticket and is also republican.

LEWIS AND CLARKE. Helena, 5th.—Total vote of this town is 274 of which Knowles has a majority of 56. The entire republican ticket has a majority.

MISSOULA. MISSOULA, 5th.—Three-fourths of the republican ticket appears to be elected. The republican gain in the county is 1,000 over 1892 (railroad construction year.) Knowles probably has a majority in the county.

BEAVERHEAD. Dillon, 5th.—This and four other precincts gave Knowles a majority of 74.

CHOTEAU. BENTON, 5th.—Indications are that Toole has a majority of 150 in the county. Hunt, (republican) candidate for district attorney, a resident of that place, is probably elected, and the republicans will probably elect their treasurer.

CUSTER COUNTY. Bull. MILES CITY, 8:10 p. m. 4th.—Six hundred and eighteen votes were polled at Miles City. Knowles and Blake will probably carry this county.

Miles City, noon, 5th.—At this hour 391 votes have been counted in this precinct. Knowles has 215 and Toole 177. Blake 232 and Vivion 165. Savage 221. Irvine 170. Ladd 188, Brandenberg 201. Kreidler 184, Dear 239. Kennedy 196. Burleigh 102. Holt 198, Biddle 197. Nothing definite from the country. Count will not be completed before evening.

A Missing Cashier. Charles Paine, cashier for the Northern Pacific road at the Minnesota transfer, has been missing since Monday last week. The superintendent of the transfer, on looking over his accounts, noticed a shortage of about \$1,800. The loss will not fall on the Northern Pacific company, but on the transfer company, providing Paine's father, who was his bondsman, does not pay the amount.

About 2,000 persons were seated in the Star Theatre in Glasgow, Scotland, on Saturday evening. A discharged employe of the place raised the baseless cry of fire and the whole audience arose and made a rush for the doors. The result was a wild panic and a terrible scene of death. People rushed and trampled upon each other, causing frightful loss of life. Sixteen bodies were found dead upon the stairway and twelve other persons were picked up at the point of death.
