were fired the fourth taking effect. Quinn staggered and fell, shot in the left side. Holland coolly replaced the revolver in his pocket and walked unperturbed from the saloon. Quinn died in a few minutes without speaking a word. Holland was captured an hour afterwards in the cellar under the Walker house.

A Postoffice Fight.
The people of Big Timber have become involved in a contest over the appointment of a postmaster which promises to divide them into factions and culminate in lasting disadvantage to that thriving burg. The facts as nearly as can be gleaned are as follows: Some time since Mr. C. T. Busha, the present incumbent of the postoffice, tendered his resignation accompanied by a recommendation for the appointment of J. L. Goughnour as his successor. In due time came the announcement by dispatch from Washington that Mr. Goughnour had been appointed postmaster at Big Timber to succeed C. T. Busha, resigned. This was evidently surprising intelligence to a large number of the residents of Big Timber, a portion of whom at least were dissatisfied with the new appointee. Nothing further was heard of the matter, however, until two weeks later another dispatch from Washington announced the appointment of Harry J. Dixon as postmaster at Big Timber. This naturally fell like a bomb in the camp of the supporters of Mr. Goughnour and an inquiry was set on foot which disclosed that this action was the result of a demand made upon Montana representatives by residents of Big Timber. A counter movement was then started by the friends of J. L. Goughnour to secure his re-appointment, and a petition signed by 140 residents of Big Timber forwarded to Washington, alleging that Dixon was not a citizen of the United States, having only declared his intention to become one, and that he was not a property owner of Big Timber, and could without serious loss at any time pack his grip and bid the bouiders of that town a long farewell. Mr. Dixon, it is stated, now threatens to bring an action for damages against the signers of this petition, alleging defamation of character and damages to his financial standing, and the end is not yet.

Murder at Walkerville.
Dan Holland shot and almost instantly killed Tim Quinn in a saloon at Walkerville on the 23rd, and the affair seems to have been a cold-blood murder. The scene was the Miners' Arms saloon, of which John T. Opie is proprietor. Charley Smith was on duty behind the bar. Dan Holland is a brother of Mike Holland, one of Walkerville's aldermen and the recently elected police magistrate of that city. Dan Holland was slightly drunk and began abusing his brother Mike. He finally demanded some money of his brother, who gave him a dollar. This he spent at the bar and then demanded more, which was refused. He abused his brother again and thought some one in the saloon had called him by a vile epithet. Quick as a flash he pulled a revolver from his hip pocket and pointed in the direction of four or five men who were playing cards. "Who called me a son of a b—?" he demanded, flourishing his revolver. He repeated the question and everyone at the table got up and ran. Among them was Tim Quinn who walked over to the bar. Holland pointed the revolver at Quinn and ordered him back to his seat. He did this three times, when Quinn lowered his head and started toward Holland, as though to butt him. Holland commenced shooting. Five shots
