



## A MEMORABLE YEAR.

THE ANNALS OF 1892 GIVEN IN A NUTSHELL.

The Year Has Been Marked by Peaceable Political Revolutions, Remarkable Labor Disturbances, Unusual Disasters and Notable Anniversary Celebrations.

The year 1892 will pass into history as one of the most remarkable in the annals of the world. There have been wars and rumors of wars, famines, cholera, yellow fever and labor disturbances, election contests of a remarkable character in England and the United States, each resulting in the downfall of the hitherto dominant party; a comet has blazed across the heavens, there have been star showers, the president's wife has died, and to the president elect has come the celebration of his daughter's one year birthday.

A man who might have become king of England and emperor of the Indies died and left a fiancée, who was promptly betrothed to his brother and successor in the royal line. Three great American millionaires have gone to the grave, and the world has sorrowed at the deaths of Whitman, Whitman and Tennyson, the notable poets of our day.

But turn the shield; shut out the record of death, disaster and calamity and view the brighter side. There you may see the bright promise of prosperity incident to good crops and fair prices; the splendid possibilities of the World's fair at Chicago; the growing power and greatness of the United States; the advancement in science, invention and the arts, both liberal and industrial; the augmentation of knowledge; the increase of morality and prosperity, and as we consider the various phases of the year's record we cannot but admit that despite all drawbacks 1892 was a twelve-month in which it was well to live, to observe, to learn, to suffer and to enjoy.
