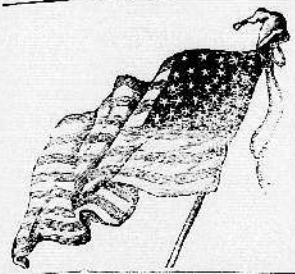

Helena in a Blaze of Glory. Immense procession—thousands of men in line.

At the opera house, which was filled to saturation, Chairman Horsfield introduced the Hon. Thomas H. Carter, who arose amid storms of applause. Mr. Carter said the campaign just closed was one for principle, not persons; and our overwhelming triumph was due to the men who had organized the party in Montana.

When the applause that followed the close of Mr. Carter's speech had subsided, Col. Sanders was introduced. The applause that greeted the Col. lasted fully fifteen minutes, was interrupted only by the shouting of, "What's the matter with Sanders for Senator?" The Col. made one of the most brilliant and witty speeches of his life. Let the earth rejoice, he said, and heaven be glad. The nation and the Territory are reclaimed. The founders of the republican party builded wiser than they knew. We don't goad the Democrats with gibes—our hearts go out to them like the parable of the laborer at the eleventh hour. We have no one to crown as they in that day had to crucify. Not to Marcus Daly, not to Sam Hauser, nor to any other man belongs the glory of this victory; but under God, to the wisdom and virtue of our people. The golden days have returned. been proved unwise by the resistance of a practically united North and has failed in some Southern states to command the approval of the people.

Now that there is again to be a republican president it is a blessing to the whole country that there is also to be a congress ready and able to act in harmony with his beliefs. The attitude of the two parties on the question of tariff was such that a great number of democrats must regard their defeat with a feeling of relief. Discussion had placed in strong light the remarkable prosperity which had been enjoyed under the existing policy, and no thoughtful citizen could fail to realize that the change proposed would be a leap in the dark. With a multitude of democrats in doubt whether the policy of the party was judicious, a verdict at the polls in favor of that party would not have fully represented the judgment of the people on the tariff question. But it would have encouraged leaders to press forward in a course which a majority of the people was not, in fact, prepared to sustain.

The LEADER is not of those who believe that upright citizens are to be found in one party only. There are democrats—and the number of them has of late been wonderfully increasing—who feel that the methods employed to secure democratic victory at the South, and in some Northern cities, could not prevail again without great peril to free government. It is not necessary to censure these men because they were not prepared to help the defeat of principles to which they were sincerely attached. But they must now regard with deep satisfaction the fact that a Solid South has again been proved the surest road to democratic defeat, and the extinction of party as at stands.

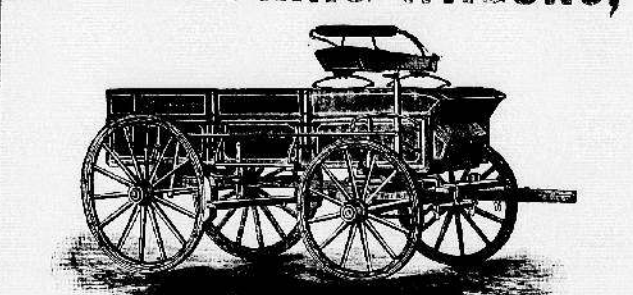
