JACK THE RIPPER YET AMONG THE ELITE.

APPOINTMENTS BY THE PRESIDENT.

BURYING THE DEAD OUT OF SIGHT.

Funeral of the Dead.

JOHNSTOWN, June 4.—In the early morning hours 7 to 8 o'clock, 180 bodies have been taken from the ruins. Most of them are unrecognizable and they are being taken away and buried as fast as possible. In a vast number of cases the bodies are almost completely buried, but the clothing or something of the kind makes the identity complete. What is needed here today more than anything else are grave diggers. This morning hundreds of bodies were lying around and there was no one to dig graves. At least fifty funerals have already passed the associated press building.

Recovering the Bodies.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 4.—It is now definitely settled that at least twenty to forty were lost on the two sections of the day express that left Pittsburgh Friday morning and on the Johnstown accommodation about to leave Johnstown that afternoon. There have been numerous conflicting reports about how many trains were caught in the flood, but from the most reliable sources it has been ascertained only these three trains were caught by the water. A passenger on the express train says he can count up at least twenty whom he saw drown. Three hundred more bodies have just been found opposite Nivala. This makes 700 found at that point.

Will Probably Cremate the Bodies.

JOHNSTOWN, June 4.—It is not believed now that the fire in the wreck at the bridge can be extinguished for weeks. The hand of Providence is in it. The suggestion made by physicians yesterday that bodies not burned be allowed to be cremated in the interest of public health, which aroused such a storm of indignation among surviving friends, is viewed with more calmness today. There is a growing sentiment that it is after all the best solution of the problem. Weeks and probably months will be required to remove the stupendous mass by artificial means, and in the meantime the putrefying remains of humanity burned therein will be doing out pollution and death to all the surrounding country.

The Indian Commission.

ROBERTSON, Dak., June 4.—The commissioners, first council with the Sioux was held yesterday afternoon. All the prominent Indians of the agency were present, as well as delegations from all other Sioux agencies. Gov. Foster, chairman of the commission, explained at length the provisions and scope of the bill. He said the white government did not intend to take the land except with their full consent and would pay liberally for it. The commission hoped to be able to convince them that it was for the interest of the Indians to sell.

"Jack the Ripper."

LOUISVILLE, June 4. A parcel containing the lower portion of a woman's body cut in halves was found in the Thames at Naxley-down this morning. Another parcel in which were a woman's thighs, was picked up at Bathurst. Both were wrapped in woman's drawers, on which the name "Gasper" was marked. The trunks and thighs evidently belong to the same body, which was of a well developed person. The remains have probably been in the water ten days. It is feared that "Jack the Ripper" has again been at work.

But Little Suffering.

PHILADELPHIA, June 4.—Supt. Pettit of the Pennsylvania road made his way to the edge of the city of Lockhaven this morning. The principal citizens say there is no suffering. All the houses had six to ten feet of water in them. Only one was drowned there but several lives were lost at Mill Hill. This is the first news from Lockhaven since Friday.
