Soldier Creek all Right on the Goose.

Joins the Old Flag and Keeps Step

To the Music of the Union-Republicans Triumphant.

Helena Stultified by the Democratic Boodlers!

Unworthy to be the Capital of a Great Commonwealth.

A Mere Horde of Mercenaries to be Bought and Sold.

HELENA, Oct. 4.—[Special to the LEADER.]—It will require the official returns to settle the gubernatorial election and the favorable complexion of late dispatches from Meagher and Ferguson indicate that the official count will give the election to Power by a small majority. Precincts in these counties, yet unreturned are republican by fair average majorities and it is reasonable to hope that they will make a great victory complete all along the line. Carter's majority is estimated at 1,522. The state senate stands, republicans 9, democrats 7; the house, republicans 28, democrats 27. The Independent says that revised figures will confirm the election of Toole and carries his majority above 600, and claims for the legislature 40 democrats to 31 republicans. It states Carter's majority at 907.

Whole Republican State Ticket Elected.
HELENA, Oct. 4.—[Special to the LEADER.]—This evening's Herald says it is impossible yet to give figures on the state ticket, but the whole republican state ticket below the governor is elected by majorities ranging from 300 to over 1,500. On Power and Toole the vote is very close, there being scarcely 30 votes difference between them. Not until the full vote of every county is at hand will the result be known and it may take the official count to determine who shall be our first state governor. There is absolutely nothing in the claim that Toole has 400 majority and it is based purely on jaundiced democratic estimates. News from the back counties and county precincts may throw the result either way and certainly the republicans have as much if not more right to count on those than the democrats. We do not concede Toole's election and do not believe we will be called upon to do so. The Herald places Carter's majority at 1610 and says that the legislature will stand 38 republicans and 33 democrats. The democrats claim the legislature by eight majority and Toole's election by over 500.

Money on a Tight.
New York, Oct. 4.—Money in the stock exchange continues strong ten percent, per annum as paid by the majority of borrowers for the use of money until Monday.
Real Estate Deals.
The Central Avenue addition sale made yesterday was owned as follows: Collins, Dickerman and Webster, two tenths; Julius Horst and Geo. Lockhart one tenth; H. P. Rolfe two tenths; J. S. Miller one tenth; Barnes & Collett four tenths. The addition is sold to a Boston syndicate, of which J. Perkins is trustee. The syndicate will proceed to sell to the parties desiring to build. The consideration expressed in the deed is thirty-five thousand dollars.

ELECTION RETURNS.

From the chief centers of population in the state the returns are beginning to come in and generally confirm the previous assurances of an almost overwhelming republican victory. The Journal says that two republican senators will represent Montana in the United States senate. Twenty-eight members of the lower house, out of a total of fifty-five, have been elected by the republicans beyond the shadow of a doubt. Add to these nine senators safely elected, and the republicans will have a total vote on joint ballot of thirty-seven, or a majority of three. These figures may be relied upon, with the possibility of a gain of one representative in Silver Bow. The Journal gives the annexed table as the complexion of the lower house:

The figures from Butte indicate that the republicans will make a gain of another member of the lower house when the returns are in from the one precinct yet unreturned, making a majority of four on joint ballot. Late dispatches also indicate that the official figures will still further swell the list in outlying counties and that the joint representative for Deer Lodge and Beaverhead will also be added to the republican column. HELENA, Oct. 4.—[Special to the LEADER.]—The campaign of 1880 will long be remembered as the most hotly contested one ever fought in Montana. The result is close, and in some cases will require the official count to determine who is the lucky man. The stump orators did their part nobly, but their eloquence and arguments only reach the ears of the few, while the daily and weekly newspapers, brim full of solid truth and silent eloquence, quietly enter the cabin of the miner and the palace of money king, and all of its contents were read and analyzed in detail and opinions formed by them. The orators kept up the enthusiasm while the newspaper formed the opinions.

As the LEADER was in the foremost rank in the battle just closed and was largely circulated throughout the territory, a few opinions from leading republicans in this section relative to the good work done by the LEADER may not be amiss.
